Capt. Caton is in good health and enjoyed his stay at the Home, the accommodations being as good as at a first-class hotel and Commandant W. W. Elder and the other officers are courteous and ever watchful for the comfort of the old soldiers in their care. There are about 100 inmates in the home, 75 being in the barracks and 25 in the hospital, and the number cannot be increased until the legislature makes added appropriations to the maintenance fund. There have been three deaths the past winter and as several of the old soldiers will return to their homes for the summer there will be a number of vacancies and Capt. Caton thinks that Sergeant Dunlap, who has made application for admission, will be admitted to the Home about the first of May. Of the old soldiers from Jackson county in the Home Capt. Caton reports that Chas Goodwyn of Williams Creek is quite feeble and does not leave the house at all. John Dodson formerly a foreman on Wm Bybee's ranch, is well and takes his three meals each day. B. J. Lawson, Jas Bass of Footh Creek and T. Merrill, a former well known music teacher of Medford, are each in good health.

T. L. De Vore has traded his place on Williams creek to W. L. Detrick of Grants Pass, for the latter's fine imported Percheron stallion, Norgaro. Mr. De Vore will move at once to Jacksonville, and keep his horse here and in Medford.
