Prohibitionists Nominate Ticket.

A goodly number of the Prohibitionists of Jackson county gathered in a mass convention in the Chautauqua building in Ashland on Wednesday of last week and placed in nomination a full county ticket.

Temperance people have no expectation of electing their ticket, for they do not number over 100 votes, but they are out for a principle and say they will stand by their ticket even if they are in a hopeless minority. D. H. Hawkins was made chairman and A. L. Kitchin secretary.

A committee on enrollment of members was provided for and as such committee the chairman appointed M. Votaw, A. L. Kitchin and R. A. Powell. A short cut was taken on nominating a ticket that work being placed in the hands of a committee composed of B. B. Paull, M. D. Wilson, L. F. Lozier, E. S. Wolfe and D. L. Rice. After a short consultation this committee made the following nominations which were endorsed without dissent: Joint representative, B. B. Paull, of Ashland; representatives, M. D. Wilson,

of Talent, J. Merley, Central Point; county judge, A. C. Howlett, Eagle Point; county treasurer, J. T. Eads, Medford; commissioner, J. L. Downing, Ashland; sheriff, H. S. Brumble, Medford; recorder, D. H. Hawkins, Ashland; assessor, A. L. Kitchin, Ashland; justice of peace, J. P. Gilmore; constable, Ashland precinct, J. T. Smith.

The following county central committee was named: D. L. Rice, A. L. Kitchin, D. H. Hawkins, of Ashland and E. S. Wolfe, L. F. Lozier of Medford. The committee organized by electing the following officers: Chairman, D. H. Hawkins; secretary, D. L. Rice; treasurer, A. L. Kitchin. The executive committee was authorized to fill all vacancies that may occur on the party ticket. Three resolutions were submitted by D. H. Hawkins and were unanimously adopted by the convention, and are substantially as follows:

Resolution No. 1, says that whereas the municipal government of Ashland has experienced much difficulty in its efforts looking towards the proper and necessary enforcement of the local option laws in said city, and whereas, non-enforcement, or but partial enforcement, is owing largely to the fact that under existing state laws, "out-lawed" liquors may be kept in bulk in places of business without risk of confiscation and, whereas, the mere act of keeping in "bulk" alcoholic beverages, in towns where the sale of the same has been forbidden by law, does not constitute a misdemeanor punishable by either fine or imprisonment, therefore, be it

Resolved, that we, the Prohibition party of Jackson county, in convention assembled, recommend that a bill be submitted at the next session of the legislature, to incorporate, that the act of keeping in "bulk" intoxicants (spirits, vintons or malt), excepting for medicinal or mechanical purposes and by such persons only as shall be given authority by the state, shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable by fine or imprisonment.

Resolution No. 2:—Whereas, men of strong character and right purposes in life, merit the respect and confidence of all men, and,

Whereas, H. S. Evans, mayor of Ashland, has so far proven himself a man of the people and for the people, as to look after the enforcement ordinances looking toward the betterment of social conditions and public morals in said city, therefore, be it,

Resolved That we, the Prohibitionists of Jackson County, in convention assembled, do hereby express our high appreciation of Mr. Evans' able and efficient service.

Resolution No. 3 advises and recommends that Gen. Nelson A. Miles be the choice of the Prohibition party as its candidate for the Presidency in the next national campaign.
