

Honors For Rev. Strange.

At the session of the Southern Oregon Presbytery held in Ashland last week the subjoined resolution was passed unanimously as a special honor to Rev. F. G. Strange of Jacksonville who for the past four years has been stated clerk for this Presbytery, but has resigned on account of his removal to Kent, Wash. where he takes the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church of that place.

Resolved, That whereas, our dear brother, Rev. F. G. Strange is about to remove from within the bounds of the Presbytery of Southern Oregon to labor within the bounds of the Presbytery of Puget Sound, we take this opportunity of expressing our regret at the loss of so valuable, lovable and faithful worker of sixteen years, of which fourteen were spent as pastor of the congregation at Ashland.

As a presbyter, clerk of Presbytery and chairman of the Home Missionary Committee, he has rendered valuable service to this Presbytery and he leaves with our deep regret. Our prayers go with him and his family, that the blessing of the Head of the Church may continue to follow them and their sphere of labor.
