The increased depth to which the ledge is now being worked is showing rock of greater value and is verifying the prediction of mining men that as the depth increases the richness of the ore will steadily increase. Mr. Opp is a running his quartz mill day and night with no stops even for Sunday and he is getting out the the gold in good quantities as is proven by the size of a brick he deposited at Beekman's bank Friday, the output of his mine for the past four weeks and which was large enough to satisfy the ambition of a miner.
