#### Number of Votes Registered.

Registration of voters is proceeding very slowly and up to Thursday of this week but 2491 names had been filed with County Clerk Orth. As there are above 4500 votes in Jackson county and the registery books close May 16 there will have to be a hurrying up in the register-ing or a large number of voters will be put to the great inconvenience of secur-ing six freeholders to swear in their vote for them on election day. This registration will hold for two years and the books will not again be open until March, 1906 and those on the 1904 list can vote at the presidential election this fall and all special elections without again registering. Geo. A. Dyson, one of the principal owners of the Yellow Jacket mine on Forest creek, was in Jacksonville Tuesday for a load of provisions and for powder and coal for use at their mine. Mr. Dyson stated that they are actively proceeding with development work at their mine. Last fall they sunk a shaft 60 feet but such quantities of water came in that they had to discontinue work, but the depth they reached proved that the rock was quite rich and the quantity of ore more than met their expectations. Having a favorable location for reaching the ledge by a tunnel, which would enable them to handle the ore cheaper and to remove the water, they began driving a tunnel, last fall and now have it in 225 feet with 75 feet more to drive before they will reach the ledge. The formation is diorite of the hardest kind and about a foot per day is all the speed that can be made in the tunnel. Mr. Dyson has assisting him W. I. McIntyre and M. A. VanGorden, two of the most experienced miners of this district. The tunnel will reach the ledge at a point 50 feet below the bottom of the shaft and an upraise will be put in to give connections. The Yellow Jacket is one of the most promising ledges on Forest creek and if it proves to be the mine that is now indicated it is the intention of Mr. Dyson and associates to put in a mill this fall and go to working ore.
