Jackson county is a corporation having over \$100,000 of business to transact each year and the judicious and economical expenditure of that money is a matter of serious concern to the taxpayers. All this vast business is under the control of the county court at the head of which is the county judge. A private corporation having so extensive business would secure the brightest and shrewdest men to be had to handle its interests. The same requirements hold good with the taxpayers who make up the corporation of Jackson county and those in the Republican party have chosen two of the ablest and most successful business men in the county as their candidates for county judge and for commissioner. A better qualified man for county judge than Geo. W. Dunn could not be found. He is a trained business man of broad experience and he is a successful farmer and what is more he has a college education and is so well read that it will be no effort at all for him to acquire a sufficient knowledge of all law points that come before the county and the probate court to enable him to transact all duties in that line prudently and legally. For commissioner a better selection could not have been made than than George Brown for he is a trained, successful business man of long experience, in honesty above a possible suspicion and his long residence in Jackson county has made him thoroughly familiar with all details of the county's needs. With three such men as Geo. W. Dunn, Geo. Brown and present Commissioner J. Patterson Jackson county would have a county court for business acumen not excelled by any other county in the state.

The Republicans were exceedingly fortunate in securing George L. Davis as their nominee for county clerk, for he is an expert bookkeeper, and one of the most thorough business men in Jackson county and he has the order and method in his work that is so essential in keeping in tangible shape the multitude of records and papers that pertain to the clerk's office. Thornton's nomination to be really an ovation expressive of the admiration and the confidence that the Republicans of Jackson county have in him as a man fitted by every qualification for the important office of sheriff.



Capt. Thornton's honorable career in the army proves that he is a man of fine executive ability and business experience and his heroism at Tarbon Bridge proves that he could coolly face any emergency or danger that might arise in the discharge of his duties as sheriff. So popular is Capt. Thornton at Ashland where he has been known since his boyhood, that it is conceded that he will have above 200 majority in that town.

Owing to the peculiar conditions governing the duties of coroner that office can easily be made an expensive one to the taxpayers if the incumbent decides to work it for all there is in it. That no unnecessary expense will be created should the Republican nominee for coroner be elected is known to all who have the acquaintance of Dr. Warren L. Cameron for he is a man of strict integrity and high professional standing and no coroner's inquest will be held by him except that the facts fully warrant one, yet it is equally certain that he will not go to the other extreme and refuse to examine into a case that the public welfare requires to be done.

Ivan Humason was given the nomination for treasurer by acclamation, a proof of his popularity, and as one of Jackson County's best known business men he is certain to be elected to the office for which he has been nominated, and what is said to be one of the best tickets ever submitted to the voters of Jackson county.

C. A. Dickerson is a young farmer with a thorough education, pleasing address and possessed of the qualifications that will make of him a competent recorder. No predictions are permissible in his case only a statement of fact that he will be elected and will make a thoroughly reliable and competent recorder.

Supt. P. H. Daily's popularity was attested by the enthusiasm in the convention and it is an omen of the success that will attend him at the polls in the June election when he will be chosen for another four years term as school superintendent of Jackson county.
