Support of Straight Tickets.

Ex-Governor Black, of New York. This may seem a plea for partisanship. I so intend it. Every great chapter in the world has been written by a partisan. Every great deed which courage and devotion could perform, the partisan has done. Every crisis that has raised a front so terrible and threatening that only the best and bravest could hope to win, the partisan has met. Every great cause which called for hopeless years of suffering, and demanded men whose struggles ended only with the grave, has enlisted only partisans. Out across the vast and never-ending plain of human sacrifice the marks that will be visible as long as men shall come this way are the footprints of the partisan; and the imperishable monuments to liberty and truth are built upon his bones.

A non-partisan is an unbeliever. He goes where the wind goes. He is ready to agree with those who oppose, and the first word upon his tongue is compromise. There are no mountains in his country. Everything must be brought to a dead level. All landscapes are made smooth by reducing the elevations. He removes opposition only by surrender. No non-partisan was ever found upon a summit unless partisans had raised him there. Destitute of strong beliefs, he is destitute of great courage. His character has never aroused my admiration; his professions have never gained my confidence.

Vote for two judges, Judge Hanna and Judge Benson and vote for three representatives, W. I. Vawter, H. Von der Hellen and D. H. Jackson. All other candidates on the ticket but one for each office can be voted for and to make a good selection for each office look for the name that has Republican printed after it and make an X before the name of the candidate.

Joe A. Thomas, of Medford, one of the Socialists candidates for representative, addressed a meeting at the court house Saturday evening in the interests of his party. Owing to a lack of advertising and a lack of interest in Socialism the attendance was small, there being only about forty persons present. Mr. Thomas is a ready speaker, full to overflowing with enthusiasm for his party and he made a good showing for the principles he is advocating, but it is not likely that he made many converts, for Socialism has too many radical, impractical features to meet the approval of the average American. Mr. Thomas frankly states that he does not expect to be elected but is making the campaign for principle and not for glory or profit.

Voters will bear in mind that two circuit judges are to be voted for in this district and each voter will make a cross before the two names for whom he wishes to vote. The Republican nominees are Judge H. K. Hanna and Judge H. L. Benson, and a mark should be made before each name by those desiring to vote that ticket. But only one name can be voted for for district attorney as this judicial district has been made into two sub-districts, one composed of Klamath and Lake and the other of Jackson and Josephine counties and for the latter two counties Gus Newbury is the Republican candidate.

In selecting H. Von der Hellen as one of the nominees for representative the Republicans made the choice of a man who has met the universal approval of the voters of that party and it is safe to state that his name will be checked on every Republican ballot cast next Monday. Mr. Von der Hellen has resided in Jackson county for the past 17 years and he owns and resides on a fine farm and stock ranch on Antelope Creek. He is a man of thorough education and broad experience and his home life has been above reproach. He has not been an office seeker and this is the first time that he has been on a ticket and this honor came to him without his solicitation. While he is thoroughly American in all his predilections yet his nomination is highly gratifying to the voters of German descent in Jackson county and they are giving him a hearty support in the campaign and will give him a solid vote next Monday. Mr. Von der Hellen will get more than his party vote in Jacksonville and he will be strong in Ashland and Medford while among the farmers he will poll the entire Republican vote.
