There will be services Sunday morning in the Methodist church at Central Point, and Jacksonville in the evening, Rev. Sanford Snyder preaching at both places. On the following Saturday and Sunday, June 11, 12, quarterly meeting will be held in Jacksonville by the presiding elder for this district, Rev. D. T. Somerville, of Grants Pass. There is now a good prospect that the Golden Spike mine at Missouri Flat will be fitted up with a mill and permanently operated. J. M. Retallac, a well known Applegate miner, has bonded this mine from the owner G. W. Bailey and Tuesday he was in Jacksonville to examine the title to see if it was free from entanglements. There is now over 100 feet of tunnel in this mine which has reached some very good ore. It is Mr. Retallac's plan to fully develop the mine and if it proves to be as rich as it now appears to be he will this fall complete the purchase of the mine and put up a quartz mill.

Miss Josephine Donegan will close her school at Applegate this Thursday. A program of pleasing selections will be rendered in the afternoon by the pupils. In the evening a box social and a dance will be given at Rose's Hall the proceeds of which will be applied to a fund with which to purchase uniforms for the Applegate baseball team. Miss Donegan is credited by the patrons of her school of having made a success of her work and it is probable that she will be engaged to teach the next term which begins in September.

Rev. Robert Ennis, who expected to move back to Jacksonville some time since from Turner, where he is in charge of the Presbyterian Church in that place writes to Dr. Robinson that the continued illness of his little daughter, who has been very low with fever for the past 11 weeks renders it imperative that he remain with his family for a time yet, but he expects to be in Jacksonville to hold services at the Presbyterian Church on Sunday, June 12, and if his child's health continues to improve he will remain over for the following Sunday by which time he expects to be able to move his family to Jacksonville. He will reside in town for the present, but later on he expects to move to his fruit farm on Jackson creek a mile west of Jacksonville.

Frank Bellinger, who has the contract for carrying the morning mail from Medford to Jacksonville, has had so much passenger and parcel traffic of late that the single seat rig which he used be-

came inadequate to his requirements and he is now using a fine two seated rig. Mr. Bellinger makes daily trips, Sunday included, and leaves Medford at 6:30 a. m. and arrives at Jacksonville about 7:30 a. m. when he leaves at once for his return trip to Medford. This morning hack service will soon become popular with the traveling public for the ride at this hour of the day is a delightful one the cool, invigorating air, green fields and beautiful groves by the roadside with the birds out for their morning carol make an ideal environment. Mr. Bellinger's charges are very reasonable, the passenger fare being 25 cents with a low rate on parcels and light freight.

N. S. Bennett, an orchardist and nurseryman near Talent, was in Jacksonville Thursday with a load of dried fruit which he sold to the local merchants. Mr. Bennett reports that fruit prospects are very encouraging and that a big crop is a certainty and that orchardists anticipate a good price for their fruit. Mr. Bennett states that his nursery stock is growing finely. He planted 10,000 grafts of Newtowns, Spitzenburgs and Jonathans this spring and some of them are now fully two feet in height and growing like a Kansas sunflower. As proof of early bearing of Rogue River fruit trees Mr. Bennett has a Jonathan apple graft planted this spring that is bearing a large well formed apple that gives promise of fully maturing. Mr. Bennett intends to take a photograph of the little tree later on when the apple gets large enough to show well and send the picture to the Oregon Immigration Rooms at Portland.

When this grading is finished the county rockerusher will be brought here and sufficient rock will be crushed to macadamize the greater part of the road. Alfalfa haying is now on and the yield promises to be fully up to the average. Spray pumps are busy dishing out Paris green to codlin moths. Orchardists have their trees in fine condition and the fruit prospect is very promising.
