Sensible Grange Resolutions.

The following resolutions were passed at the r. c. n. session of the Oregon State Grange held at Corvallis and the points made show that the Grangers have sensible, practical ideas on how the country schools should be conducted and also the class of newspapers that should be brought into the home:

Realizing the tendency of the present time, and that our system of education leads the children away from the farm, we favor a more liberal support by the state of our country schools. We recommend the centralization of schools, providing the central point be in the country.

We urge upon the members of our subordinate Granges the necessity of electing men for our school officers who are qualified to fill such positions, and who are vitally interested in the cause of education.

We declare for a more practical education that Nature's studies and the elementary principles of agriculture be taught in our public schools.

That we have text-books and teachers who, instead of teaching our children to get away from the farm, will dignify farm life, show its possibilities, and draw more young people to it.

We urge upon the patrons of the Grange the necessity of a good library in our country schools, among which should be a liberal number of books pertaining to farm life.

We believe the morals of a nation are the reflection of the morals of home, and we ask the mothers and guardians in our Grange to discriminate against sensational newspapers publishing detailed accounts of crime, suicides, prizefights, and improper advertisements.
