Work on a Smelter.

Development in a practical way of the mines of Southern Oregon is being pushed and the time is not far distant when big quartz mills and smelters will be as plentiful in this district as in the other great mining districts of the West. Of the progress of work of installing the smelter now being erected at Talkilma in the Waldo district the Grants Pass Courier makes the following mention:

Two car loads of machinery for the Talkilma Smelter arrived here this week and is now being transported to the mine. The shipment included an 80 horse power boiler, a Connersville blower with direct connection with 60 horse power engine, an electric light engine and dynamo and a sampling engine of 20 horse power. The machinery is being moved as rapidly as possible and smelting will be commenced about the first of July. A good force of men is employed in the erection of buildings and other work and the preparatory operations are being pushed with rapidity.

Other machinery is arriving by the car load.
