The Sterling mine is in the channel of an ancient river and Mr. Hinkle states that the fossil remains of animals are frequently found in the cement gravel that is being worked for gold. Recently a tooth was found that measured four by six inches across the face, but it had been broken off so its length was not known. Last year a tusk of a mammoth was found that was 11 inches in diameter at the face and 14 feet long but it was friable that it could be gotten out of its bed of clay except in fragments. Many fragments of bones are found. These bones are of animals that were evidently drowned in some flood of those ancient rivers and become embedded in the gravel beds to lay for countless ages until nothing but a few of the larger bones are left to tell of an animal larger than the modern elephant that once wandered over a country in climate and river courses far different from what is now found in Rogue River Valley.
