Political gossip has already taken up casting a horoscope of the campaign two years hence. On the Republican side but little is being said as to possible candidate's hopes and expectations, the defeat of nearly half of the ticket, while the party has a plurality of over 400 in the county, makes politicians feel that it is more a question of men rather than of party in Jackson county. Democratic plans are more discernable and it seems quite probable that Judge Prim will again be a candidate for county judge four years hence, but it is also as likely that he will be his party's nominee for circuit judge six years hence. The Judge is taking his defeat like a man and will, as soon as his term is out, open a law office here in Jacksonville and resume the practice of his profession. As to other Democratic possibilities it is a certainty that R. B. Dow will be a candidate for re-election for recorder, and it is also likely that D. H. Miller will be his party's candidate again for treasurer. For sheriff, Deputy Sheriff Oris Crawford will be most certain to gather in the Democratic nomination. No candidates for the other offices have been mentioned but when the time comes the Democrats will have no difficulty in securing a full list as will also the Republicans.

The transfer or rather promotion of Rev. Father J. D. Murphy from Jacksonville to Eugene has been postponed until such time as Arch-Bishop Christie is able to resume his official duties and issue the necessary orders. His Grace is now at a sanitarium in Oakland, California, where he is being treated for acute indigestion brought on by overwork in attending to the multitude of duties connected with the affairs of his diocese. The enforced rest and hygienic treatment he is receiving is giving renewed health and thought to his Grace and he expects to be able to return in the near future to Portland and again take up the work of his office. Father Murphy left Wednesday for Ashland where he united in marriage Mr. George Corum of Medford and Miss Kate Jacobs of Klamath Falls the services being solemnized in the Catholic church at that place Wednesday afternoon. Sunday Father Murphy will hold his usual services in Ashland, and that afternoon he will leave for Portland where he will remain a week while attending the biennial meeting of the Catholic clergy of the diocese of Oregon.

The Lewis and Clark expedition authorities are responsible for these remarks concerning the name of our state: "The name Oregon first appeared in print in Jonathan Carver's 'Travels Through the Interior Parts of North America,' which was published in London in 1778. The origin of the name is one of the enigmas of history. Carver professed to have received it from the Indians in the country of the upper Mississippi, where he had pushed his explorations. The Indians, he says, told him of the River Oregon flowing to the western ocean, but how much of tale was his own invention it is impossible to say. Jefferson used the word in his instructions to Lewis and Clark showing it was beginning to have a vogue before 'Thanatopsis' was written; but it was Bryant's solemn poem with its sensorious verse, which appeared in the year 1817, that familiarized the word 'Oregon,' and soon put it on every tongue. Various account of the Lewis and Clark expedition had appearance both in the United States and Europe before the appearance of 'Thanatopsis,' but undoubtedly it was Bryant's expression, 'Where Rolls the Oregon,' that did most to spread the name before the world."

Official Vote of Klamath County.

Local option was defeated by a vote of 455 to 329 and the direct primary law carried by a vote of 518 to 164 in Klamath county. The following shows the total vote of the county as officially determined for the several candidates at the June election, 1904:

W. A. Smith, who since February has been employed at Missouri Mine on Carbury creek, came to Jacksonville last Friday and remained until Tuesday when he left for the Walla Walla country where he will join a harvesting crew. These crews usually number from 25 to 35 men 40 to 60 horses and the outfit consists of a big steam thresher, three to four headers, and a messwagon and camp outfit provides accommodations for the crew. Harvesting begins along the Columbia river the last of June and ends in October in the foothill sections, though it is a frequent thing for harvesting to be yet on when the snow falls. The wheat grown in that section is a short, stocky variety and does not cripple down or shell out for a long time after it is ripe. Mr. Smith is an expert sacksewer and makes at that work from \$3 to \$4.50 a day.

For district attorney for Lake and Klamath counties, E. M. Brattain, Republican nominee, is defeated by 84 votes by W. J. Moore, D., of Lakeview, who secured Klamath county by 137 majority, while Brattain received 53 majority in his home county of Lake.

The official majority for Reames for district attorney for Jackson and Josephine counties is 3 in the former and 48 in the latter.
