Dear Sir and Friend: I have been somewhat derelict about writing but better late than never.

I got to Roseburg last Friday about 11:30 p. m. Put up at hotel very tired, having been keeping late hours for several nights. The bus took me out to the Home where I was regularly installed and have been learning the ropes ever since. Sunday morning the first thing I noticed on arising was the flag at half mast for the death of a comrade, Earl J. Lamson. He was buried that evening having died from dropsy and being a very large man was in no condition to keep over. He was a member of Company B, Fourteenth Iowa Infantry and before coming to the Home was a resident of Jackson county and mined on Footh Creek and was well known in that camp.

So far as I have seen I am delighted with the Home. The grub is solid and substantial and well cooked. The beds are very nice and clean, in fact cleanliness is the order of the day here. There are over a hundred inmates and they all appear to be contented and happy. What I miss the most is the little children. They are not allowed to run promiscuously on the ground. Please tell my friend, Miss Estella Levy, that I got here all right without accident or mishap notwithstanding I started on Friday.

Many thanks for the paper you sent me. I have been measured for my suit and don't want to ask for a furlough until I can go in style.

Judge Hanna having a farm in that locality and he wished to see how his renter, Ira Love, was getting along with it, and he with the others of the party had a day's fishing in the streams of that vicinity. As to their luck in angling for the speckled beauties the entire party is reticent, but the generous hospitality of Mr. Love prevented any shortage that a lack of fish might cause in the commissary supplies of the fishermen.

Mrs. Edward Tyer of Medford spent Friday in Jacksonville with her sister, Mrs. J. K. Reeve. Saturday morning she left by Wendt stage for Williams Creek to spend a week at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. Chapman.

The French are the World's great canal builders, the Suez canal, in which so great a number of vessels pass that one is always in sight at a given point, is one of their greatest successes, and the Panama canal would have been another had it not been for some untoward circumstances that were too much for a Frenchman's nerve and they turned the job over to the Yankees to complete. It seems as natural for a Frenchman to dig canals as it is for a beaver to build dams. Even in the most unpropitious location a Frenchman will plan to build a canal, these redoubled ditchdiggers now having a scheme under consideration to build a canal across the Sahara Desert and expect to pipe water from the Mediterranean sea with which to operate it. Jacksonville has a small colony of Frenchmen and they too display their national characteristic for building ditches and canals. The latest effort of these versatile sons of La Belle France is the organization of the Jacksonville French-American Water & Canal Company, of which Jean DeRoboam is president, Samuel DeRoboam, secretary and treasurer and John Renault superintendent and chief engineer. It is

a close corporation and no stock is likely to be placed on the market, to the disappointment of the many wealthy people of Jacksonville. The object of this Company is to furnish the U. S. Hotel with a larger and better supply of water than now had, and Monday Superintendent Renault with much ceremony and little wine broke ground on the ditch that is to bring water from Jean DeRoboam's residence property to the hotel and he expects to have the work completed this week. Much to regret of our Frenchmen the water, owing to its scarcity in Jacksonville, can not be carried in an open canal, but will be brought to the hotel by pipe. The water will come from a well that will afford an ample quantity of pure, cool water and it will be a decided betterment to the water service both in quantity and regularity that has been heretofore had at the United States hotel. A gasoline engine is to do the pumping and water will be piped to all parts of the hotel.

W. R. Stansell who has been operating a sawmill on Coleman creek six miles from Phoenix, has bought a body of timber on Sardine creek seven miles east of Rock Point and he is now engaged in moving his mill to the new location which is being done by teams the haul being about 30 miles. It is expected to have the mill in operation in about two weeks. The timber is one of the finest bodies of yellow and sugar pine in Rogue River Valley and stands on open level ground where it can be easily handled by trucks. The lumber will be shipped for the present from Gold Hill but it is Mr. Stansell's plan to get a siding put in at Rock Point and make at this place his shipping point. The lumber teams will have an easy down grade all the way to the railroad thus making the hauling charges very reasonable. Of the mill crew H. O. Childreth, Louis and P. A. Dooms, D. W. Day, and David Patterson moved to the new location this week there being three families of them camped out in tents. The others of the crew will move to the new location within the next few days and by Monday a full crew will be on hand ready for work.

A car load of concentrates was shipped Thursday to the Selby smelter at Vallejo, California, from the Opp mine. Work at this mine is being pushed with vigor by Mr. J. W. Opp the owner and the quartz mill is run day and night and also Sundays and the monthly clean-ups are large and are increasing each month as the ore is steadily growing richer as a greater depth is reached. Mr. Opp has had several good offers for his mining property, which consist of 400 acres of land, one and a half miles west of Jacksonville on which are located several promising ledges besides the one he is working, by parties who would more fully develop the property and enlarge the quartz mill to 30 or 40 stamps.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Clark were in Jacksonville over Sunday on a brief visit to Mrs. Clark's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Luy. Mr. and Mrs. Clark were on the way to their home at Gervais, Oregon, where Mr. Clark is publishing the Gervais Star, one of the bright papers of the Willamette Valley and is also the postmaster for Gervais. For the past month Mr. and Mrs. Clark have been in the East where they visited the Worlds Fair at St. Louis, and attended the meeting of the National Editorial Association to which Mr. Clark was one of the delegates for Oregon. They had a delightful trip and report the fair a success.
