

LOCAL NOTES.

J. D. Cook, secretary of the Hydraulic Mining Company, returned Thursday to his home in Medford from Jump-off-Joe where his company is operating a large hydraulic mining plant. Mr. Cook reports that they yet have a fine head of water and are moving dirt in good shape and expect to have about four acres piped off as this season's work. They will not begin their annual clean-up for a month or more and they are certain that it will be one of the most profitable that they have yet made. Arthur Howland, well known in Jacksonville, is in charge of the mine and to his untiring energy and skill is due much of the success in the operation of the mine this year. Mr. Howland while young in years is a miner of long and varied experience and has seen much of the world, among his ventures having spent two years in the East Indies on the island of Sumatra, where he was in charge of a large mining plant owned by Dutch capitalists. Mr. Cook reports that the M. Pitt Hydraulic & Quartz Company, which bought a quartz claim of his company last fall, has made a rich strike and have opened up a ledge 11 feet wide of ore that carries high milling values. The ore is of even richness and the tunnels and crosscuts of the development work show that there is an immense body of it. The superintendent of the company, A. C. Hooper, came out from Jump-off-Joe at the same time as did Mr. Cook and immediately went to land, the headquarters of his company, to confer with the other officers with regard to an offer that has been made by an Eastern company to purchase the mine for \$15,000. These Eastern parties intend, should they secure the mine, to put up a mill in the near future and carry on permanent mining operations.
