### A Simple Refrigerator.

W. O. Hemlow, a practical fish canner, sardine packing, condensed milk, and fruit evaporator man of Astoria, was in this city this week on his way from Coos Bay to Astoria. While here, he, with others, were talking of cheap means of keeping fresh meat, butter and milk cool during the summer months, and to demonstrate that a practical refrigerator could be erected and operated without cost he built one at the shop of Mr. Benedick and convinced the onlookers that it is foolish to spend money for ice during the hot season.

Following is a description of Mr. Hemlow's iceless refrigerator: Build a wooden frame the size you wish your refrigerator, making brackets for shelves, then cover the frame with ordinary burlap, making the top double thickness. The side to be used for door can be left open on one side or a swinging frame door covered with burlap may be used then take an ordinary coal oil can and punch a hole in each side near the bottom of the can and insert wooden plugs so that the dripping of the water may be regulated, then fill the can with water, place it on top of the covered frame, regulate the flow of the water and your refrigerator is complete. The model which Mr. Hemlow built was placed in the sun and started working and a plate of soft lard placed on the shelf. Within an hour the lard was solid and hard as if it had been kept on ice for a month. This is a simple arrangement which anyone can build with little expense. Try it.—Roseburg Plaindealer.

### Bureau of Labor Making Investigation.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The Bureau of Labor is making an investigation of the labor difficulties in Colorado under the organic act of the bureau, which charges the Commissioner of Labor to investigate the causes of and the facts relating to controversies between employers and employes. The investigation, which is already under way, may last for some time, as it is the intention of the bureau to go to the very beginning of the troubles, endeavor to determine exactly what the difficulties are and the causes leading to them.

### Fire at St. Louis.

Fire Friday morning burned the Hoo Hoo house at the Worlds Fair grounds, entailing a loss of \$100,000, on which there was an insurance of \$20,000. The "House of Hoo Hoo" was erected by stock subscribed for by the Lumbermens association and the members of the Hoo Hoo society at a total cost of \$100,000. The building was designed for a club house for lumbermen and Hoo Hoos visiting the exposition, and was lavishly furnished throughout. Its loss takes from the fair one of the most noticeable attractions one which has been patronized in particular by foreign visitors who were thus enabled to study in a practical way American woods and American lumber work. The fated building was located near the Oregon building which also came near being destroyed.—Roseburg Plaindealer, June 27th.
