

Visit of Noted Pioneer Woman.

Mrs. Elizabeth T'Vault Kenney, of Jacksonville, a pioneer of 1845, attended the pioneer reunion last week. Her father, Colonel W. G. T'Vault, was the first Postmaster General of Oregon under the provisional government and also Postmaster at Dardenelles, Jackson County, during the territorial days. At this time Mrs. Kenney, then unmarried, was the deputy, thus being the first deputy Postmistress in Southern Oregon. She was one of the party which came in to Oregon via "Meek's Cutoff," the eastern end of which started from the point where the present town of Vale, Malheur County, is now located. Mrs. Kenney's father was the first editor of the first newspaper on the Pacific Coast, the Spectator, published at Oregon City, the first issue of which was on February 5, 1846, and also the editor of the first newspaper in Oregon, south of Salem, the Table Rock Sentinel, Jacksonville. In this office she was employed in various capacities. She has the blood of Daniel Boone and the poet Robert Burns in her veins.—Sunday Oregonian.

Montana to Have Two Bishoprics.

BUTTE, Mont., June 28.—A Miner special says that the apostolic delegate at Washington has received a brief from Rome erecting the diocese of Great Falls Mont., and appointing Rev. M. Lineham a priest of the archdiocese of Dubuque, Ia., the first bishop of the new see. This action creates two bishoprics in Montana the see of Helena previously having jurisdiction over the whole state.

The counties of Cascade, Choteau, Flathead, Teton, Fergus, Valley, Yellowstone Dawson, Custer, Park, Rosebud, Sweet Grass and a part of Meagher County will be embraced in the new diocese, and the of Helena.

Father Cleary, of Minneapolis, one of the most brilliant priests of the church, will be the Bishop of Helena, but the appointment has not been officially announced. Soon after Bishop Lineham shall have entered upon his new duties, a cathedral and bishop's house will be erected at Great Falls.

Lewis and Clark Centennial.

International scope is assured to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition to be held at Portland, Oregon, from June 1st to October 15, 1905, by President Roosevelt's approval of the act of Congress making an appropriation for the Exposition, and his invitation to foreign countries to participate. Portland's Exposition will represent a total outlay of over \$5,000,000. Though covering 405 acres of land and natural lake, it will be compact in form, and the average person will be able to see and comprehend it all in a few days at moderate cost. The cream of the foreign and domestic exhibits to be made at St. Louis this year will be transferred to Portland at the close of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The United States exhibit will be moved entire to Portland and installed in building to be specially erected. This exhibit will be worth \$800,000. In addition Portland will have many features which will not be seen at St. Louis, such as exhibit demonstrating the life, customs and industries of China, Japan, Hawaii, Siberia, Russia, Alaska, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and India.

The Lewis and Clark Centennial will be the first international exposition under Government patronage ever held on the Pacific Coast. It will be in every way a Western exposition. The railroads will make low rates from Missouri and Mississippi river points to Portland, and exceptionally low rates will be in effect between Portland and the Rocky Mountain region.
