Have plenty of good wholesome grub, well cooked, clothes washed, ironed and mended, and girls to wait on the table". The latter statement shows that the Old Sergeant still has a kindly feeling for the ladies, a failing for which he was noted in Jacksonville. He called on Mrs. Zeigler and Mrs. Autenreith, in Roseburg, but former residents of Jacksonville and found them well. The Sergeant attended an Eastern Star entertainment last week in Roseburg and had so pleasant a time that he overstayed his leave of absence and had to go to the hotel for the night, returning to the Home the next morning. He intends to attend the Soldiers reunion in Jacksonville this fall and he sends his regards to his old comrades and friends here. The Sergeant reports the death at the Home on Friday, July 9, of James Boss, an inmate from Jackson county. The remains were interred Saturday in the cemetery at the Home, with appropriate exercises. Mr. Boss was 75 years old and entered the Home in 1899. He was for years a well known resident of Jackson county and mined on Foots creek and in the vicinity of Gold Hill.
