SECOND GAME.

Umpire Huston called "play ball" and the second game, which was to be of seven innings only, was on, and the "cowbell brigade" on the bleachers again turned on their "infernal machines." Lester was again on the slab and Strube behind the bat for the home team but the visitors replaced Martin with a young "southpaw" by the name of Cleveland whom they seemed certain would make Jacksonville look like thirty cents.

Ashland was first up. Papa Hulin tapped one to Nunan and was caught out of course, Martin batted to 1st and lacked just a mile of making a hit. With two out Moore came up and hit a hot one between 3rd and short and stole second, from which bag he raced home on Carter's little hit to left field which was lost by Stribe when fielded, to 1st. Lester saw it was up to him so he struck Miller out.

In the second half, Schofield got a pass and went to 2nd on a wild pitch. Cline also got free transportation to 1st, and a neat sacrifice by Strieb placed him on second and Schofield on third, and still another wild pitch scored Schofield and put Cline on 3rd. Strube made 1st on a little pop up that Cleveland muffed. Strube was put out stealing 2nd but Cline scored on the play. Collins was hit by pitched ball and Pat Donegan got a nice safe one into center field, but was forced out at 2nd by Lester who hit a dinky one to the infield.

In the first half of the 2nd inning, McKerchief hit safe and was forced to 2nd by Neil's walk to 1st. Freeburg forced McKerchief out at 3rd on an attempted sacrifice. Cleveland then hit a fierce one to Collins near 2nd which that boy held on that bag and whipped to 1st, retiring the side with as pretty a double as you ever saw.

In the 2nd half the home team continued to bump Mr. Cleveland's benders in good shape and when the dust had cleared away Jacksonville was two more juicy runs to the good, thanks to Cline's hit to the left field fence.

In the 3rd chapter Ashland made their other run which closed the run getting, as far as they were concerned. Hulin bunted safe, stole 2nd on Strube's bad throw, made 3rd on Moore's sacrifice and scored on a mixup of Collins and Cline back of short. In the 2nd half of this inning no scoring was done altho' Nunan and Ed. Donegan each hit safe.

No scores were given either team in the 4th inning owing to brilliant fielding of both teams.

In the 5th Ashland was retired in short order. Cleveland was thrown out at 1st, Hulin went the same way, Martin hit safe and Moore was killed at 1st.

In their half Jacksonville warmed up again. Strube hit to 3rd and reached 1st on an error, making 2nd on Collins nice hit to center after which Pat Donegan gets to 1st on errors and the bases are filled. Strube scored on Lester's sacrifice and Collins scored on Nunan's hit. A wild pitch and a hit by Ed. Donegan scored Pat. Strube's out on a fly ended the agony.

Again in the 6th Ashland was short-lived. Carter was nipped at 1st by a nice piece of work by Collins, Miller's long fly to center was captured by Pat Donegan who made a brilliant running

catch. McKerchief then struck out.

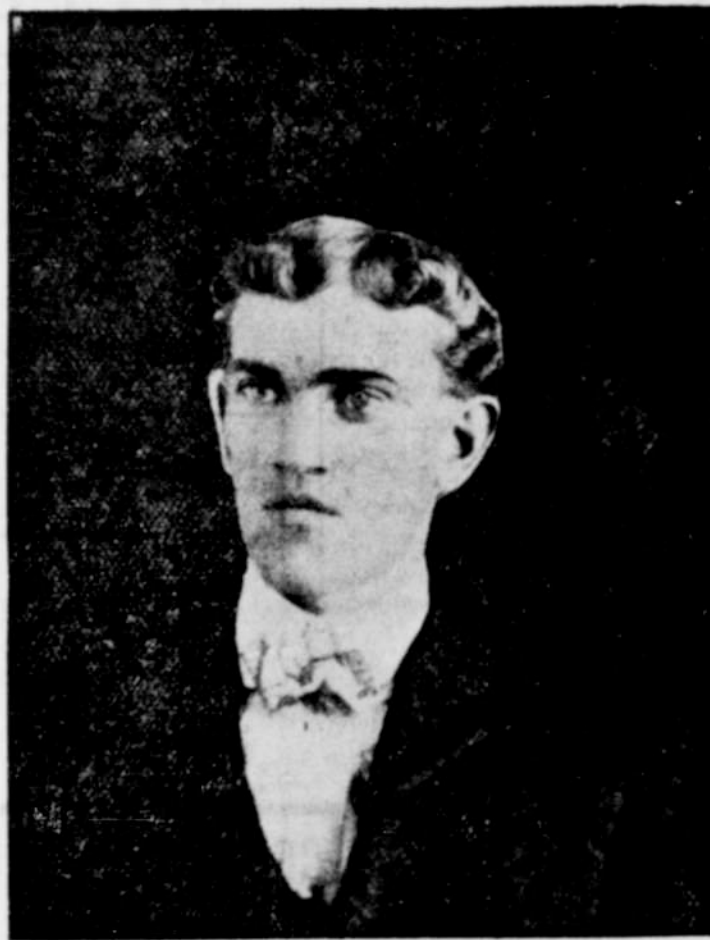
