New Homestead Law.

The following amendment to the homestead law was passed by congress just before adjournment this spring which enable many to secure land who have heretofore been debarred by a previous entry:

That any person who has heretofore made entry under the homestead laws, but who shall show to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of the General Land Office that he was unable to perfect the entry on the account of some unavoidable complication of his personal or business affairs, or on account of an honest mistake as to the character of the land; that he made a bonafide effort to comply with the homestead law and that he did not relinquish his entry or abandon his claim for a consideration, shall be entitled to the benefit of the homestead law as though such former entry had not been made.

SEC. 2. That any homestead settler who has heretofore entered, or may hereafter enter, less than one-quarter section of land may enter other and additional land lying contiguous to the original entry which shall not, with the land first entered and occupied, exceed in the aggregate one hundred and sixty acres, without proof of residence upon and cultivation of the additional entry; and if final proof of settlement and cultivation has been made, for the original entry when the additional entry is made, then the patent shall issue without further proof: PROVIDED; That this section shall not apply to or for the benefit of any person who does not own and occupy the lands covered by the original entry: AND PROVIDED; That if the original entry should fail for any reason prior to patent, or should appear to be illegal or fraudulent, the additional entry shall not be permitted, or, if having been initiated, shall be cancelled.

SEC. 3. That commutation under the provision of section twenty-three hundred and one of the Revised Statutes shall not be allowed of an entry made under this Act.

Approved, April 28, 1904.

Indian War Veteran Dies.

The death took place recently at the Siskyou county hospital in Yreka of Elliot Heryford. Mr. Heryford was 82 years old a native of Missouri and one of the early pioneers of this Coast. He came to Jackson county in the early '50s and resided in various parts of the county, though most of the time in Sams Valley. He was in the Indian War of 1855-56 and was entitled to a pension, but he only applied recently and though Judge Day did his best to help the old veteran, through lack of proof he could not secure it for him to enjoy it, though it will probably be granted later on, his heirs if he has any getting the benefit of the pension due at the time of his death. Mr. Heryford was a single man and had no relatives on this Coast.
