Judge S. J. Day and Mrs. Day returned Saturday from Ashland where they had been during the entire session of the Chautauqua assembly. The Judge and Mrs. Day attend the assembly each year and they report this by far the best assembly yet held by the Southern Oregon Chautauqua Association.

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Conklin, Miss Amelia Britt, Miss Estella Levy and Mrs. Mamie Dox drove to Ashland Friday evening to attend the closing event of the Chautauqua assembly, which was the oratorio, "The Holy City." They all were well pleased with the oratorio, the rendition of which was splendidly done.

W. R. Garrett, who has been employed for several months at the Sturgis mine as teamster, will leave next week for Clackamas county, where he will remain for the next two months while engaged in threshing and in hop drying, he being an expert machine feeder and hop dryer. Mr. Garrett is a former resident of Clackamas county, he moving with his family to Jackson county last winter and so well are they pleased with this section that they will become permanent residents of the county. Mrs. Garrett and children are now in Medford and will remain there until Mr. Garrett's return, when they will probably move to Jacksonville.

Mrs. Elizabeth Kenney arrived home Saturday after an absence of six weeks during which she visited relatives and friends in Portland and Roseburg. While in Portland she attended the annual meeting of the Oregon pioneers where she met many of her old-time friends. Mrs. Kenney is a pioneer, coming to Oregon in 1845 with her parents, her father, Colonel W. G. T'Vault, establishing the Oregon Spectator at Oregon City in 1846, the first newspaper on the Pacific Coast and moving to Southern Oregon in 1852 where he established the Table Rock Sentinel at Jacksonville in 1855, the first paper published in this section of the state.

C. C. Purcel, millman, school director and road supervisor, was in Jacksonville Tuesday from his sawmill on Upper Applegate, remaining over night and Wednesday returned with a load of supplies. Mr. Purcel stated that he was running his mill full time and was having good sale for lumber. He is now getting logs from the west side of Applegate half a mile above his mill, where there is a fine body of yellow fir. The logs are floated down the river to the mill boom. Mr. Purcel is getting out both pine and fir lumber and his timber being well up in the mountains, is of large size and fine quality, which enables him to get a quality of lumber above the average for this section. Mr. Purcel supplies the trade with dressed lumber as well as rough. Mr. Purcel has been a school director in his district for a dozen years and says they need a teacher for their school which is to begin September 1st for a three months term. They have heretofore paid \$100 per quarter, but will pay more if they can secure a thoroughly competent teacher. There will be 25 to 30 scholars in the school.

A Gavel of Historical Significance.

With commendable public spirit Mr. David Linn has undertaken to provide a gavel for the use of the presiding officer of the National Mining Congress that is to be held in Portland, August 20 and 21st that is to have an historical significance. The wood for the gavel Mr. Linn secured from a manzanita that grew in Rich gulch, which is located in the south part of Jacksonville, and which is famous in the history of the gold discoveries on the Pacific Coast as the place where the first big find of gold was made in Oregon and which caused the rush to Southern Oregon in the Winter of 1851-52 and which continued for several years until there were thousands of mines scattered over this section of the state. Mr. Linn sent the wood to Portland Monday to his son Fletcher Linn, who is president of the Oregon Furniture Company, who will have it turned and finished in his factory. The gavel is to be encircled by a gold band on which will be engraved an inscription stating the place from which the wood and the gold of which it is made was obtained. The gold for the band will be from Rich gulch, where mining is yet carried on in a small way, the money to purchase it of the miners being supplied the Jacksonville board of trade.

Mr. Linn is a Jacksonville pioneer of 1852 but never has mined though he has always taken much interest in the development of the industry and he considers the presenting of a historical gavel to the National Mining Congress where will gather leading mining men from all parts of the United States a splendid opportunity to advertise the mineral resources of Southern Oregon.

Missouri Flat Mining News.

W. H. Miller who with Mrs. Miller and their daughter Elsie, arrived home last Friday from Missouri Flat on Applegate where they had been on a visit with relatives.

Of mining operations in the Missouri Flat district Mr. Miller states that there is much mining and thorough development work going on at Missouri Flat this year. The Mountain Lion mine recently purchased by Col. Crawford and associates is being put in shape for mining operation. A force of 20 men recently is employed in opening up the mine and in putting the mill in order for work. The mill is of five stamps but preparation is being made to enlarge it to 10 stamps.

The Homestake mine has been purchased by Eastern parties of W. S. Bailey. So great is their confidence in it that they have paid one-half of the purchase price and are making extensive preparations to fully develop the mine.

The Golden Spike was sold some time ago by G. W. Bailey to J. M. Retallac. This mine is known to carry high grade ore and to have an extensive ledge. Mr. Retallac has a crew of men at work driving a tunnel on a lower level than the one now in and if it shows the ledge to be as rich as on the upper level he will put up a mill and begin the working of the mine. There are a number of other ledges in the Missouri Flat district that gives promise of being of value and there is every likelihood of this being one of the best mining districts of Southern Oregon when the ledges are all opened up.
