

PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COURT

Large Amount of Business Transacted By The County Court At Its August Meeting.—Many Bills Allowed.

The August term of county court was held last Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday with Judge G. W. Dunn, Commissioners J. Patterson and Geo. Brown, Clerk J. S. Orth and Sheriff J. M. Rader present.

The residents of Road District No. 8 having contributed \$208 toward the improvement of the roads in that district in accordance with an agreement whereby the county was to contribute a like sum the court ordered a warrant drawn in favor of Isaac Wulf, supervisor of said district, for the sum of \$208.
