Grant Werts and wife were here this week visiting relatives. They are on their way from Portland to Calif., Mr. Werts having been to Portland where he was receiving treatment for an amputated leg, which he lost in the employ of the S. P. company.

Mrs. Sarah Harper died at the home of her grand-son-in-law, Ben Carter, last Sunday morning and was buried in the family lot at Rock Point Monday. Mrs. Harper, commonly known as "Grandma Harper" was highly honored and respected here and was 87 years of age.

D. T. Elliott a partner of E. D. Thompson who owns a store at Wimer died while on a hunting trip in Ramsey canyon last Friday night, aged 40 years. Mr. Elliott was a former resident of Eugene where his family reside but the remains were in too bad a condition to ship to that place and were buried near Wimer on Monday.

To Introduce The Growing of Vetches.

C. E. Gaddis was in Jacksonville Monday on business in connection with the Medford creamery of which he is the owner. Mr. Gaddis states though this is but the second year in which the creamery has been in operation a fine

business has been built up and the demand for their butter is greater than they can supply. The supply of cream is yet too variable to make the operation of their creamery the financial success that would be possible were condition as they could and should be. The next to impassable condition of the roads during the winters practically prevent the farmers delivering cream during three to four months of the year. Then during the latter part of the summer the cream supply is lessened by the shortage of feed causing the cows to give less milk.

As to obviating the road handicap Mr. Gaddis sees much encouragement in the good roads movement that is now on in the county and the practical methods that the county court is adopting to secure a betterment of the highways and he thinks the time is not distant when the farmers can bring cream to the creameries as readily in winter months as during other seasons of the year. And through the introduction of vetch raising he hopes to enable farmers, who are on hill land where alfalfa is not a successful crop, to have an abundance of cheap feed for their cows during the season when the pastures are short. As to the value of vetch as a forage plant Mr. Gaddis states that in nutrition one ton of vetch hay is worth fully two tons of grain hay. The special value of vetch to the hill farmers of Rogue River Valley is that this plant will produce a good crop where alfalfa will not grow at all and it will on similar land produce nearly double that either wheat or oats will yield. Mr. Gaddis says that in Douglas county, where he also operates a creamery, and where he introduced vetch growing seven years ago, that he has seen good crops grown on land where it was but two or three feet to bedrock.

In order to stimulate the dairy industry in the hill district of Jackson county, Mr. Gaddis will ship in a large quantity of vetch seed this fall which he will sell at cost. As to time of sowing early in the fall is the best time but spring sowing will produce a good crop if the season is favorable. For those not familiar with vetch it may be stated that it is a kind of pea, the seed being about half the size of the small garden pea.
