Dr. J. F. Reddy returned Thursday from the Blue Ledge copper mines where he has been for the past two weeks superintending the construction of the new road up Elliot creek which he says is now completed except a bridge across the creek. He reports development work at the progressing satisfactory and that the ore is showing up in good shape.

J. F. Crump, who has 1200 acres of land on Little Applegate on which he is opening up a fine stock and hay ranch, has proved irrigation a profitable investment to farmers in this action. This spring he put in a small tract of oats for horse feed and from the 3½ acres he harvested 14 tons of oat hay, without irrigation not more than six or seven tons would have been raised.

The government geodetic survey, which has been in progress between San Francisco and Portland for the past several months, is to be completed at Roseburg. Arrangements to that end are now being made. The site chosen for the final work is a knoll on Mt. Nebo, in West Roseburg. Some men are now engaged in establishing a triangulation station there and in a few days a party of surveyors will arrive to perform the scientific portion of the work.—Roseburg Review.

Dr. J. W. Bailey, of Portland, state dairy and food commissioner, was in Jacksonville Monday for a few hours, while making a tour of Southern Oregon towns on business connected with his office. Dr. Bailey is a most efficient official and the short-weight, adulterated and unhealthy food dealers and the filthy dairymen are made through his vigilance to feel the law's heavy hand and to be more honest and more cleanly in the manner of conducting their business. Dr. Bailey has done more than any other man in Oregon to build up the dairy industry, which has now become one of the chief sources of revenue to the farmers of the state and now Oregon is beginning to export instead of importing butter as was the case until the last year or so.

The Oregon Law says that the September term of circuit court for Jackson county shall begin on the first Monday in September and the law also says that the first Monday in September is Labor Day and a legal holiday on which court cannot be held. To overcome this conflict of laws Judge Hanna will not convene court until Tuesday morning, September, 6th and he has had the jurymen summoned for that day. The docket is rather longer than usual and court will probably be in session two or three weeks. As is Judge Hanna's rule he will call the jury cases at once that he may dismiss the jurymen at the earliest possible day, but to provide for the contingency of a jury trial being demanded later in the term he will retain a couple of jurymen on the venire, who reside convenient to the county seat and can be summoned without extra expense enabling a jury to be called by the addition of extra jurymen. Should the Judge discharge the full jury new jurymen could not again be summoned for that term, for the law does not permit a circuit judge to make up a jury list, that being done by the county clerk.
