Taxes have been steadily coming in and the indications are that Sheriff Rader will have a very small delinquent list this fall. Treasurer Miller expects that by the last of this month a sufficient amount of tax money will be in to enable him to make a call for county warrants.

Miss Josphine Donegan will begin next Monday a six months term of school in the Applegate district. There will be a three months session this fall and then a vacation of six weeks during the worst of the winter weather, when the term will be completed. This will be Miss Donegan's second term in the Applegate district and she has earned by her faithful and earnest devotion to her school work the highest regard of all the patrons of the school.

A. F. McCreary, who owns a small place on the hill south of town, has left a sample lot of peaches at the Sentinel office that are from trees growing on his place. Mr. McCreary has about sixty peach trees and they have bourn a crop each year since old enough and though the trees grow on dry hill land with no irrigation whatever, the fruit is of large size, juicy and of perfect flavor, proving that the hills about Jacksonville are well adapted to growing peaches.

Besides the history of the Russo-Japanese war, which is brought up to date in its editorial department, "The Progress of the World," the Review of Reviews for September has two articles which summarize the distinctive achievements of the Japanese armies. George Brown was in the county seat Wednesday on business at the court house. Mr. Brown owns a fine farm near Brownsboro and he is engaged in stock hay and grain and now he is adding fruit raising he having planted 20 acres of land to apples, the varieties being Newton and Spitzenberg. Though the trees have been planted but two years so strong has been their growth, by reason of the thorough cultivation given them by Mr. Brown, that many of them are bearing fruit this year, having one or more perfect and well grown apples on each tree. Mr. Brown expects that within five years his orchard will be bearing in quantities sufficient to enable him to begin to market fruit. His land is on Little Butte creek and is well adapted for fruit raising and with the likelihood of having a macadamized road to the railroad by the time he has much hauling to do Mr. Brown anticipates that his orchard will be a profitable venture for him.

M. H. Roundtree and E. C. Steiger have moved their families back to town from the Iowa mill where they have resided since last spring. Messrs. Roundtree and Steiger have operated under a lease the mill and logging camp belonging to the Iowa Lumber & Box Company since last winter but they have given up their contract and will engage in other work for this fall. The Iowa Company have not given out what their plans are in regard to operating the mill, whether they will run it themselves or lease it to other parties. The mill is now shut down, the extensive dry season drying up the springs from which water was had for the donkey engines in the woods and as there is no water convenient to haul logging operations had to be shut down until the fall rains set in.
