 Will Barmum, who since he has been old enough to work has been fireman, engineer, conductor and foreman of track gang on the Rogue River Valley Railroad, has given up railroading and is in Portland learning the Jeweler's trade and playing in an orchestra. Will is a bright young man and is a fine musician as well as a good mechanic and will succeed in his new work.
 Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Hubart are back from Pleasant creek where they have spent the summer while Mr. Hubart was employed in Silsby & Ketcherson's saw mill. This mill has shut down for the winter as has also Lee Bros. mill and Smith & Pracht's mill. Silsby & Ketcherson cut some 2,000,000 of lumber this season much of which is yet in the yard but they expect to get it all delivered at Woodville for shipment before the rains set in, they now having 15 teams hawling.
 Alphonse Beavenue arrived home from Marysville, Calif. where he has been working for the past year. He reports Ralph, who has resided in Marysville for the past three years and where he is now conducting an oyster house, was married recently to Miss Laura Bean, of that city. Mr. and Mrs. Beavenue intend to visit the home folks in Jacksonville in the near future. Alphonse will become a partner with his brothers John, Olney and George in working their placer claims, two of the boys having charge of the Rich gulch claim and two working the Duggan claim on Forest creek.

Work on Antone Rose's residence on fourth Third street is progressing rapidly. Contractor G. L. Schermerhom of Medford has the stone foundation laid and now has the frame of the house in place. The dwelling is to be a modern one story cottage the main part to be 16x24 with additions one of 12x18 and the other 14x18 feet. Back of the house is to be cold storage room to be connected with the main building by a porch under which will be a well, now being dug by John Renault and Mack Johnson. Contractor Schermerhom has Albert Gangwich and J. U. Willike assisting him on the carpenter work.

Fritz Ruch, of Thompson Creek will leave Saturday with two wagon loads of fruit and vegetables which he will sell in Kalamath county. Mr. Ruch makes several trips each year to Klamath county and has built up a profitable trade in selling farm produce to the stockmen of that county. He will be accompanied this trip by George Birdseye who goes to see the country.

NEW STAMP MILL

Dr. Reddy and Mr. Opp In San Francisco This Week Purchasing New Machinery For Their Big Mill On Jackson Creek.

TO BE IN OPERATION IN 90 DAYS

Work on the big quartz mill for the Opp mine began Monday and a force of 25 men are employed in blasting off the rock and doing other work on the foundation at the building. About 100,000 feet of lumber has been purchased of the Jackson County Lumber Company and the Iowa Lumber Company and it will soon be delivered. The office building formerly occupied by the Iowa Lumber Company was purchased and is to be moved to California street near the Whipp building and will be used as an office for the Company. Dr. Reddy and Mr. Opp have been in San Francisco this week purchasing the machinery, for the mill and rails and ore cars for the mine. F. E. Willett, who is construction superintendent is rushing work and will increase his force to 40 or more by another week as it is the intention of the company to have the new mill in operation in 90 days.

County Court Proceedings.

The September term of county court closed last Saturday, Judge Dunn and Commissioner Patterson constituting the court, Commissioner Brown being on a visit in the east.

Petition was denied of W. A. Stewart, et al, for a county road on the ground that heavy damages had been filed against said road.

Contract made with Jackson county

Abstract Company, of Ashland, to allow the county officials the use of the Company's plats and abstract books for looking up land ownership for assessment purposes, said contract to be from October 1, 1904 to September 30, 1909 and the county is to pay \$12.50 per month for the use of said books.

Permission given Blue Ledge Copper Company to erect poles and maintain telephone and telegraph wires along county roads.

Tax sale certificates were assigned to M. N. Long for \$15.83 and to J. C. Hammond for \$7.95.

Report of Jean De Robaum showed that there were 14 inmates in the county hospital.

Petition of E. D. Briscoe et al was granted for a county road on upper Trail creek.

Chas. E. Tuill of Medford was appointed county stock inspector for the year ending July 1 1905.

Regarding The Gold Hill Light and Power Company.

E. L. Gurnie, who is to have charge of the electric station for the Gold Hill Development Company at Gold Hill, was in Jacksonville Thursday in the interest of his company in regard to receiving from the town a light and power contract. Mr. Gurnie stated that Manager Schaeffer is to return the last of this week from Milwaukee, where he has been to consult with his company and to place the order for the machinery for the big electric station to be put in above Gold Hill on Rogue river. A 500 horsepower wheel and generator were ordered for immediate shipment and will be temporarily installed at the Houck mill to supply current on contracts that require immediate service. It is expected to have this temporary plant in operation within a month and to have their wires strung to Jacksonville by the middle of October. Cottrell Brothers who have the contract for supplying the poles have some 900 cut and will soon begin delivering along the line to Jacksonville and Medford and the mining districts about Gold Hill. A line will also be run to Grants Pass and Ashland will also be placed on their circuit later on. There is every certainty that if Jacksonville makes a contract with the Gold Hill Company that the town will be lighted with electricity by the last of October, for the Company's wires will be here by that time to supply current and private contracts that they have in hand.

Report For The Conference Year.

The following report of services, rendered by the Pastor of the M. E. Church of Jacksonville and Central Point, to the Quarterly Conference held at Central Point, Sept. 10, 1904, shows the amount of work done during the past year: Improvements made on church property \$150. Sermons and addresses 156. Funerals attended 7. Marriages solemnized 14. Pastoral visits 250. Members received 21. Dismissed by letter 4. Deceased 2. Net gain in membership 15. The Quarterly Conference voted to divide the charge so as to give to Central Point and Jacksonville each a resident pastor for the coming year. And as the Annual Conference meets at Eugene Oregon, Sept. 28, therefore this next Sunday Sept. 18, will be my last service as pastor of the Jacksonville M. E. Church.
