A large steam hoist, compressor and Bürleigh drills are now in place and three four-horse teams and one six-horse team are hauling out Crescent City the remainder of the plant, a part of which is two cylinders, of 100 tons capacity each, to be used in the sweet roasting process for handling the ores, which are base, and have to be roasted before puting through the cyanide process to extract the gold.
