A movement is under way to get a postoffice established on Elk creek at W. F. Lindsey's, who will be made postmaster. There is getting to be quite a settlement of homesteaders and miners in the Elk creek valley and as it is from 6 to 20 miles for them to reach the postoffice at Persist, where they now receive their mail, the need of this office is an imperative need, which if established will make 67 postoffices in Jackson county.

Town Marshal John B. Renault, among his other duties is something of a gardener and orchardist and on a two acre tract of land that he has on the hillside east of Jacksonville he raises each season an assortment of crops that are a creditable compliment to his industry and skill. As proof that field corn can be grown successfully on the hills about this place Mr. Renault has added to the Sentinel exhibit three ears of yellow and white dent corn that for size and firmness are equal to corn grown in the Eastern states and this corn was grown without irrigation or stimulated with fertilizers, having only ordinary cultivation.

Rev. S. H. Jones, who left Jacksonville a year ago for Reno, Nevada, where he has the pastorate of the Presbyterian church in that city, writes the Sentinel in renewing his subscription that Reno is having a steady growth and is becoming a city that would do credit to any of the Western states. Nevada, which for years has been considered a state that had gone into decay is having a great boom by reason of the great revival in the mining business. He states that the marvelous richness of Goldfields has not been overestimated and that it is sure to be a greater mining camp than Cripple Creek or Comstock. Rev. Jones thinks that with its mines and the great irrigation systems that are being started that Nevada will yet become one of the prosperous and populous states of the Union.

John Swartzfager was in Jacksonville Monday from Steamboat for a load of supplies. He reports that his father who was kicked by his team last week is recovering and will suffer no permanent injury from the accident, which took place as he was driving home on Thursday of last week with his wife and sons from Jacksonville. The doubletree pin broke and he having a tight hold on the lines when the team sprang forward, jerked him out of the wagon and onto the heels of the horses when one kicked him in the breast and on the leg. Dr. Bowersox was called to attend him and found that he had a narrow escape from very serious injury.

Mr. Charles is an old soldier, having served in the Civil war in the Second United States sharpshooters.
