Persistent effort will almost always attain the purpose striven for and it certainly has in the case of the improvement in the Jackson Creek road and creek channel and now after nearly two years effort with the opposition that should not have, been the progressive element have won out and next week will witness the beginning of work on this much needed public improvement. The road committee of the Jacksonville board of trade committee have \$700 deposited in Beekman's bank contributed by citizens and by the town of Jacksonville and the committee expects to secure at least \$200 more by subscription which with \$500 that is expected from the county will insure the building of a fine roadway and the control of the creek from flooding the road. Judge Dunn and Commissioners Patterson and Brown are actively co-operating with the board of trade committee which is made up of J. Nunan, Chris Ulrich, J. S. Orth, C. C. Beckman and C. P. Briggs and there is every assurance that the work will be done economically and effectively. The work will be under the supervision of the county court and of this committee and it is expected that that Jack True, one of the best road builders in the county will have charge of the work.

Jacksonville's big gold mine is all life and activity these days and one of the best stamp mills on the coast will be in operation at the Opp mine. Mr. Opp, Dr. Reddy and Mr. Perry, the owners of the property, have been keeping things moving at a lively rate about the mine and while extensive development work is being carried on, work on the big quartz mill is being pushed as fast as men can place the material. Superintendent Willett, with a large force of men, has the frame work of the mill almost up and the building will be so far along next week that the placing of the machinery can be begun. A donkey engine was set up Monday to handle the timbers and heavy machinery. The machinery will arrive next week from San Francisco and will consist of a 10 stamp Hendy mill, Pandy concentrator, an ore crusher and all the other fixtures of a first class mill. It is expected to use electric power and the survey for the wire line has been made from the Gold Ray electric station to the mine by way of Jacksonville and the wire will be strung by the time that power is required, which is expected to be early in November. This mine will employ about 60 men and when the other 10 stamps are added next spring, the building being for that number, about 80 or 90 men will be on the company's payroll and the monthly disbursements of the company will be a big factor in the prosperity of Jacksonville.

Speeches, songs and music by the orchestra were interspersed in the courses and the time of their lives was enjoyed by all present. The hall was tastefully decorated and the management of the supper was in the hands of Miss Ollie Crump and her assistants and the menu was a credit to their skill. The visitors declared the banquet and the hospitality extended to them exceeded any previous Elk round-up that it had been their pleasure to attend. It was an invitation affair to all the Elks in Southern Oregon and was gotten up and financed by the Jacksonville members of the order, who are G. E. Nueber, T. J. Kenney, County Clerk J. S. Orth, Peter Applegate, Judge Prim, J. Cronemiller, A. E. Reames, J. M. Rader and M. F. Hanley and to their public spirit, generosity and skill in entertaining was due the splendid success of the event that would have been a credit to a town of 5000 inhabitants.
