IOWA LUMBER & BOX COMPANY

An Enterprising Southern Oregon Company Whose Business Is Rapidly Assuming Large Proportions—Plans Now Under Way For Increasing Output.

Having their accessible timber cut out the Iowa Lumber & Box Company will move their saw mill from its present location two miles northwest of Jacksonville to a new site about two miles to the southwest to a body of timber they own on the head of the right fork of Jackson creek. The work of taking down the mill and machinery will be began next Monday and the work will be under the supervision of E. C. Steiger, who has been engaged for a year by the Company to have charge of their saw mill. Mr. Steiger came here last spring from Centralia, one of the big mill towns of Washington and with M. H. Rountree, another Washington sawmill man, to run this mill under contract during the past summer, and so capable a mill man has he proven himself to be that the Iowa Company has engaged him on a salary under a year's contract to take charge of their sawmill. Mr. Steiger will move the mill to the new location and set it up during the winter months getting it ready to run early in the spring, for the Company do not think it profitable to operate the mill during the rainy season when the roads are muddy.

The Company will put on a force of teams next week to haul the remainder of their lumber in the mill yard to their factory in Medford. So great has been the demand for boxes this year that the company, though operating their factory over time and employing over 60 hands, has been unable to fill all their orders. With the present promising business outlook for the country which insures stability to the box market, the company contemplate increasing the capacity of their factory next spring and to secure a larger supply of lumber they plan to erect several small sawmills in various parts of the Valley in addition to buying all the lumber to be had of the sawmills of this section. The Iowa Lumber & Box Company has, from a small beginning, grown to be one of the big industrial concerns of Southern Oregon and the money that it puts into circulation is a most important element in the prosperity of this section of Oregon.
