During the early part of the week our Southern Oregon sunshine was obscured by low-hanging rain-clouds that came drifting over the tops of the pine-clad hills from the coast-country to the west, the few remaining yellow leaves of the oak and the maple rustled feebly in the wind, some fluttering to the ground, and the landscape grew dark and dreary as only as Southern Oregon landscape can after days and even months of the most beautiful autumn weather, following the hazy grandeur of an "Indian summer," when the hills and wooded mountains seem but faint blue shadows in the distance. It is but a foretaste of winter which will soon spread its misty mantle over the Oregon country and make of its mountain brooks of the summer, roaring torrents yellow and turbid. But even with its mist and rain a Southern Oregon winter is almost welcomed at least by those who have contended with the drifting snows, the incessant winds and the intolerable cold of the prairie countries of the "middle-west."

INCREASING OUR NAVY.

Only a few more years at the present rate of naval construction in the United States will bring the fighting strength of our navy up to that of any other nation on earth with the possible exception of Great Britain, whose great navy will perhaps remain superior to that of any other nation for many years to come owing to the fact that no year passes that many new vessels of the most modern pattern are not added to her already enormous fleets.

However, it is a matter of much satisfaction to all patriotic citizens to know that our country is fast forging to the front as a world-power and is becoming more influential in international disputes and agreements as we become more powerful upon the seas. According to recent reports our navy consists of 265 vessels now ready for service, or 327 if we include those under construction and authorized, which when completed will make us the third greatest naval power on earth, Great Britain being first, France second and Germany following us closely with a modern, well-built navy like our own.

While might never did make right, yet it sometimes saves a deal of trouble, and there is nothing like preparing for war in time of peace, as is aptly illustrated in the great war now in progress between the powerful nation of Russia and sturdy little Japan. It also illustrates

the folly of a nation depending on securing supremacy of the sea unless it keeps fully abreast of the times and equips its sailors with the most modern ships and the most modern guns, adding the newest and best every year, and placing no dependence on vessels, armament and tactics that were the best to be had a few years back.

Under the present administration, which has just received such a wonderful and overwhelming endorsement from all over our broad and prosperous land, our nation is pursuing a wise and prudent course and one which can not but result in the greatest good to the greatest number of our people.

NEWS WHILE IT IS YET NEWSY

Work with the wine-press was finished at Peter Britt's last Saturday for the season.

A fine selection of glassware at Nunan-Taylor Company's to be sold with baking power at no additional charge.

Mrs. Mary Miller left Wednesday for an extended visit in Sunny California to be gone during the winter. She will visit her son Harry, who is in the drug business at San Jose, and also her daughter Mrs. Dr. Callahan at Los Gatos.

Wm. Puhl, our enterprising barber has this week installed new gas lights which are supplied from the plant recently installed by Ed. Helms. The light is bright and brilliant and is just what is needed now that winter is coming on and it begins to grow dark about four o'clock in the afternoon.

Work has already been commenced at Tolo on the Condor Water & Power Co's plant with a view of enlarging the plant to a capacity of at least 2000 horse-power. An excavation is now being made 30x100 feet in the solid rock formation for the second power house which will adjoin the one already erected.

The cross-arms and other fixtures have already been placed on the electric poles of the Condor Water & Power Co., almost to the Opp mill and the wires have been strung to a point near town. It will be only a few days until they will have the line completed to the Opp mill which will be ready for power within a few weeks.

Rev. Sanford Snyder formerly M. E. pastor at this place was a pleasant caller at this office last Friday. He has been out on his place for a week or more where he is locating his son-in-law who will work the place for the next year or longer. Rev. Snyder went to Ashland where he preached last Sunday, and Monday started on the drive to Lakeview where he is located for this conference year.

W. H. Gore who has one of the largest and best conducted farm ranches in Southern Oregon, located near the main road from this place to Medford, was in the county seat last Saturday on business. He had just returned from a successful business trip to San Francisco where he shipped several hundred head of beef cattle bought up here in the country and raised on his ranch. Mr. Gore is one of the successful stock-raisers and farmers of Jackson county that understand the business thoroughly hence is making a success of it. One of his objects in visiting our town was to secure two good farm hands for work on his place during the winter, but whether successful in getting them or not we failed to learn.

Dancing School.

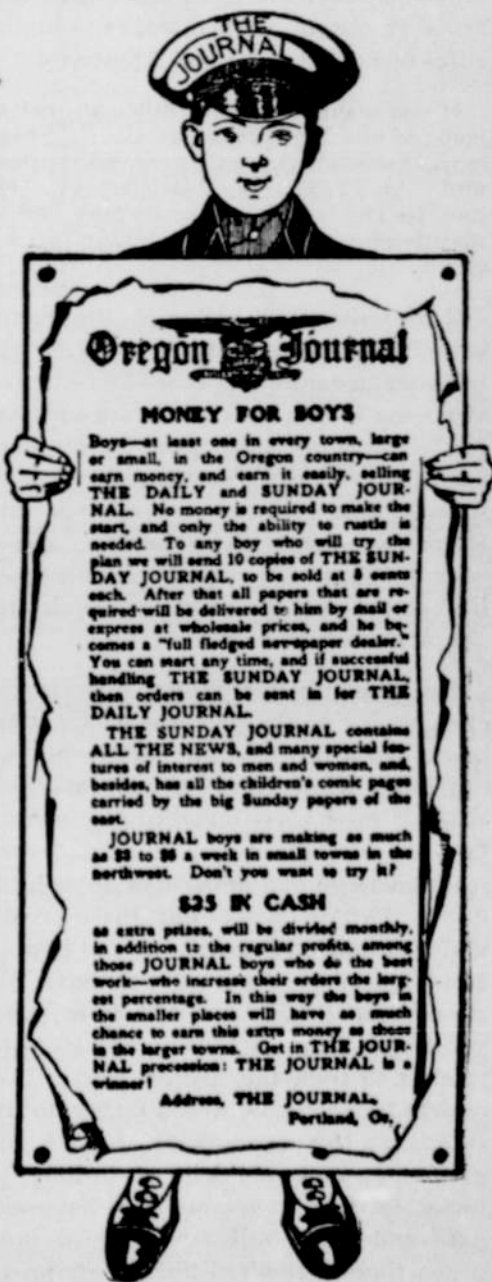
