Lewis and Clark Centennial.

International scope is assured to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition to be held at Portland, Oregon, from June 1st to October 15, 1905, by President Roosevelt's approval of the act of Congress making an appropriation for the Exposition, and his invitation to foreign countries to participate Portland's Exposition will represent a total outlay of over \$5,000,000. Though covering 405 acres of land and natural lake, it will be compact in form, and the average person will be able to see and comprehend it all in a few days at moderate cost. The cream of the foreign and domestic exhibits to be made at St. Louis this year will be transferred to Portland at the close of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The United States exhibit will be moved entire to Portland and installed in building to be specially erected. This exhibit will be worth \$800,000. In addition Portland will have many features which will not be seen at St. Louis, such as exhibit demonstrating the life, customs and industries of China, Japan, Hawaii, Siberia, Russia, Alaska, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and India.

The Lewis and Clark Centennial will be the first international exposition under Government patronage ever held on the Pacific Coast. It will be in every way a Western exposition. The railroads will make low rates from Missouri and Mississippi river points to Portland, and exceptionally low rates will be in effect between Portland and the Rocky Mountain region.

WILL NOT RESIGN

Register Bridges, of the Roseburg Land Office Declares He Has Naught to Fear From Investigation of Timber Land Frauds.

PRESS REPORT TO THE CONTRARY

According to a dispatch from Washington there is trouble brewing at the Roseburg land office which may result in both Register J. T. Bridges and Receiver J. H. Booth resigning or being asked for their resignations says the Monday's Evening Telegram. This dispatch, which was printed in the late edition of The Telegram Saturday, says that disclosures made as a result of an investigation of the office by direction of Secretary Hitchcock has made it probable that the appointment of new officials will be necessary at the hands of the Interior Department. It is known that an investigation of the office has been made, and that Special Inspector A. R. Greene, whose investigation of land frauds have brought about startling revelations, recently spent some time at Roseburg. That it is all news to him and that he has no thought of resigning and that all reports to the contrary are without foundation is the other side of the reported scandal, as given by Register J. T. Bridges, who was in Portland Saturday.

When asked regarding the dispatch to the effect that investigation of the office had resulted in the disclosure of conditions which made it possible that new officials would be appointed, and that he was ready to resign, Mr. Bridges said:

"Speaking of myself, I will say that I have no thought of resigning. Up to this time I have had no information telling me of any charges against me or the conducts of the office. I know that Inspector A. R. Greene has been making an investigation of the office, and has been taking testimony, but so far he has made no charge, so far as I have been informed. I can therefore make no statement at this time one way or the other, for I have no information upon which to base it."

With regard to a prior investigation of his office and the appointment of himself and J. H. Booth, Mr. Bridges said every one knew the history of the affair, and account the circumstances of McMillian's investigation, and how, after 12 days of research he had risked his position by returning a favorable report, in view of the fact that another inspector had been removed for submitting a favorable report of a California office.

He said that after the report had been received at Washington Secretary Hitchcock recommended the appointment of two officers to succeed Booth and himself. The Oregon delegation, said he, asked to see the report and was denied the privilege, after which a conference at the White House was ordered by the President. Following this it is claimed the President saw the report was favorable and sanctioned reappointment.

Mr. Bridges expresses himself as of the opinion that Secretary Hitchcock is still "after him" and that for this reason Colonel Greene has been making an investigation of his office. He claims to know nothing of the nature of the alleged charges but says that the officials of the Roseburg land office were instrumental in causing the arrest and conviction of J. W. Gardner and William H. McCrossen for changing land markings. Later, Mr. Bridges alleges, Gardner boasted while under the influence of liquor that he would "get Booth and Bridges yet." He alleged at that time, it is claimed, that the office had been opened nights for the purpose of making entries.

Death of Allen Hilt.

The news of the tragic death of Allen Hilt last evening, while driving homeward a few miles from Cole was received by relatives in Ashland this morning. Mr. Hilt has for some days past been hauling wood into Hornbrook, and when the accident occurred which caused his death, he had been on one of his regular trips and was returning alone with his empty wagon, which was drawn by a four-horse team, between 5:30 and 6 o'clock. He was descending Bailey hill and was perched on the high spring seat on the front of his wagon, when from some cause, just what will probably never be known, he was thrown from the wagon and under it, one of the hind wheels passing over his head, causing a fracture of the skull and killing him almost instantly. When found an hour or so afterwards he had evidently been dead for some minutes. The remains were taken to his home and it has not been thought necessary to hold an inquest.

Deceased was about 40 years of age and unmarried. His brother, Wilmer Hilt, is a brother-in-law of C. E. Lane, of this city.

Rev. J. T. Abbett and Mr. and Mrs. Lane went over to Coles at noon today, and the funeral will be conducted by the former at Hornbrook tomorrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock.—Tidings.

Why is it Mt. Pitt.

Geo. H. Himes, secretary of the Oregon Historical Society, in an article in Saturday's "Morning Oregonian," makes an appeal for an effort to restore to the mountain of Southern Oregon which is a part of the Cascade range and situated near the Jackson and Klamath county boundary line, the name of "McLoughlin." This mountain which towers 9760 feet above the sea level was early named "McLoughlin" in honor of the well known trader so prominent in Oregon history but for some reason never satisfactorily explained it was changed on official maps to "Mt. Pitt," which it is claimed has no true significance.—Ashland Tidings.
