WILL BUILD BRICK

St. Mary's Academy Buildings To Be Replaced Next Year By Larger and More Commodious Structures of Brick.

IMPROVEMENTS TO COST \$10,000

We learn, this week, from a reliable source, that the frame buildings now being used by the Sisters for school and dormitory purposes and which have been used for many years past, are to be torn down and replaced by handsome, commodious, new and up-to-date brick structures such as are needed at the present time on account of the growth and progress of the school. All of the particulars are not known at this time, but the important part to the people of Jacksonville, at least, is the fact that the school buildings are really going to be built and in the near future. The estimated cost of these many extensive improvements is from \$8,000 to \$10,000 and work on them will be begun next year.
