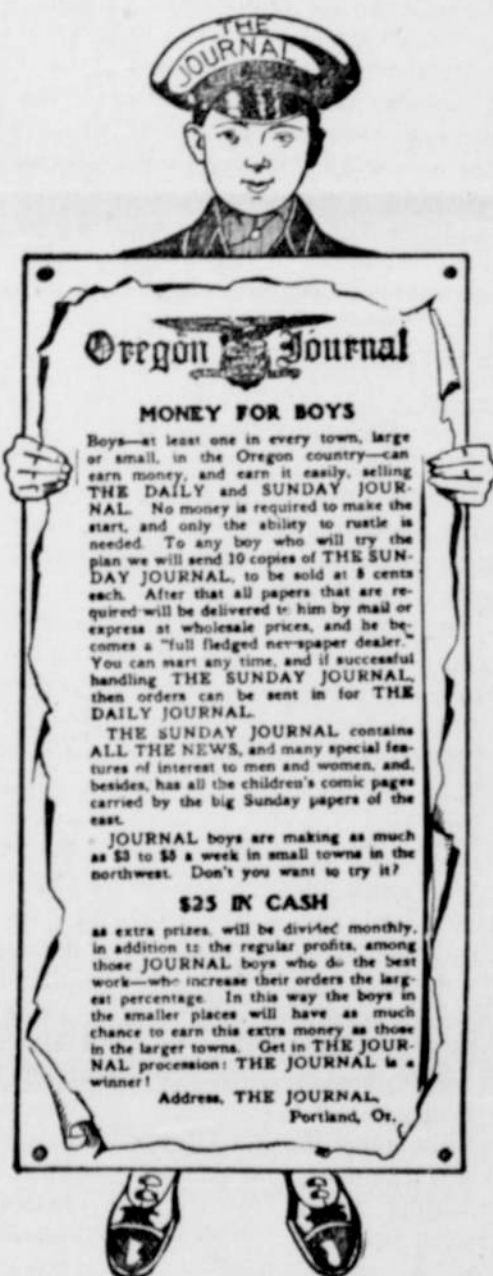
Geo. E. Neuber and "Billy" Hutton made a trip to Medford Monday to look after the new saloon they are to open up there soon.
