A New Idea for a Work-Bag.

Since the sewing fad has been introduced the smart girl has substituted a flowered silk work-bag for her reticule, which during the summer days she often carried for holding her handkerchief and fan. An easy-to-make and charming-to-look-at work-bag, and quite the correct thing to carry one's work in when attending a sewing afternoon, is made of some pretty flowered silk, with embroidery-hoops for the handles. To make such a bag, seven eights of a yard of the silk will be needed, and a pair of embroidery-hoops. The silk is shirred to the hoops, which are first covered with ribbon one and one-fourth inches wide. About four and one half yards of ribbon will be required. Bows of ribbon add to the pretty effect of the bag, and a number of girls have sewed either to the bottom or the side of the bag a flat silk sachet made with their favorite perfume. In making a bag of this sort one pair of embroidery-hoops will answer perfectly, even though one happens to be a trifle larger than the other.—December Woman's Home Companion.

Electrical Chimes At The Fair.

Electrical experts are at work upon an extremely novel feature for the opening exercises of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition on June 1, next. The scheme is to have President Roosevelt, at Washington, touch a few keys and set in motion the chimes in the towers of the Government Building at the Exposition. The chimes, 300 feet above the water will play "My Country 'Tis of Thee." The sound will carry a great distance owing to the fact that the Government Building is located on a peninsula in Guild's Lake, half a mile from the mainland. Arrangements have already been made to have President Roosevelt touch a button that will set in motion the machinery for the Western World's Fair, and it is thought there will be no difficulty in arranging for the additional feature of the chimes.

Leader of Women's Papers.

The November number of "The Twentieth Century Home" is a superbly illustrated magazine and its contents, for interest and variety, are on a par with the artistic side of this new and popular periodical. Some prominent features are "Some Fancy-Dress Balls in London," "Electricity as an Aid to Housekeeping," "Women Who Toil," and "The Homes of George Elliot." This is not taking into account the fiction, which includes a charmingly illustrated story by Florence Wilkinson entitled "The Gipsy Queen," as well as stories by Howard Markle Hoke, Tom Masson and Harriott Prescott Spofford. "The Twentieth Century Home" is primarily a magazine for women with large interests in life, who endeavor to make something of themselves, and therefore it gives considerable attention to means of commercial activity within and outside the home. This month we note at least four articles of this nature, "Why Women Fail In Business," by Elizabeth M. Gilmer; "Is Work Inimical to Beauty?" by Mrs. Wilson Woodrow; "Artistic Bookbinding for Women," and "A Woman's Farm." The desire of every woman for personal details is gratified by sketches of Mr. and Mrs. William Faversham in their Surrey home, and Julia Cooley, the extraordinary child-poet, now only eleven years of age, but already occupying a place on library shelves. Richard Le Gallienne has written a very sympathetic and appreciative account of her personality and work, while Elia W. Peattie does the same for Rose Cecil O'Neill, the popular illustrator. The useful and home-helping departments are up to their usual high standard.

SOUVENIR GOLD DOLLARS

Lewis and Clark Souvenir Coins Selling Rapidly. Suitable for Mounting as Jewellery.

Lewis and Clark souvenir gold dollars, which sell for \$2 each, are proving popular, as was expected and the first issue of 25,000 coins, will soon be exhausted, if the demand for the souvenirs continues.

When the appropriation was made for the Fair by Congress, a clause in the bill provided for the coinage of the gold dollars, the issue being limited to 250,000. The coins are of the size of the gold dollar which was formerly current, being somewhat smaller than a dime. They are different from any other coin ever circulated in that they have two heads or obverses. This was made necessary by the fact that it was desired to give credit on the coin to both Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, the explorers whose expedition a century ago, in the words of President Roosevelt, "marked the beginning of the process of exploration and colonization which thrust our national boundaries to the Pacific." On the side of the coin bearing likeness of Captain Clark are the words "United States of America" and "One Dollar." On the other side are the portrait of Captain Lewis, the words "Lewis-Clark Exposition, Portland, Ore." and the date "1904." The coin has neither wreath nor stars.

The sale of the Lewis and Clark souvenir coins is being pushed in various ways. In September, the executive committee of the Portland Commercial Club appointed a committee of fifty young women to take charge of the sale. The committee met and it was decided that each member was to secure four others for the committee, giving the completed committee a membership of 250. The committee also adopted a resolution requesting every man in Oregon to wear one of the coins. The first coin to be put into circulation was sent by the young women to the first young lady in the land, Miss Alice Roosevelt, who has acknowledged the courtesy shown her.

The immediate object of the Exposition in putting the coins into circulation is to realize funds for the Fair. It is asserted, however, that the coins will in a few years be worth more than their face value, as rarities. The Government coins the souvenirs at their face value, and the difference between that price and the selling price represents the Exposition company's profit. The coins are sold in lots of six for ten dollars, and storekeepers attracted by the small profit possible for them, are displaying them in their windows.

Jewelers are tastefully mounting the coins for scarf pins, brooches, and pendants for watch fobs, and in this form they are selling rapidly.

A circumstance that has greatly enhanced the popularity of the coins among the women is that fact that the proceeds from every sixth coin will go toward a fund for the erection of a monument to Sacajawea, the "Bird Woman." It was the "Bird Woman" who accompanied Lewis and Clark on their first journey to Oregon. Sacajawea shared with the men in the party the dangers and hardships of the long march, and her heroism on two occasions saved the lives of the company. It is natural, then, that the women of today should feel a deep interest in the brown-skinned sister who, next to Lewis and Clark, is deserving of eulogy. The statue to Sacajawea will be placed in the center of the Columbia Court, on the Exposition grounds.
