To Celebrate 100th Birthday.

Ex-County Assessor J. B. Blair of Lakeview has gone to Pendleton to attend the 100th birthday of his father, C. P. Blair, which occurs on Jan. 1st. C. P. Blair was born in North Carolina 1805, when Thos. Jefferson was president and the year he sent Lewis and Clark on their famous exploration of the Oregon country. Mr. Blair fought in the Black Hawk war in 1832 and crossed the plains to Oregon in 1853. Though he had located in Benton county he took part in the Rouge River Indian war under Col. Kelsay. Oregon Historical Society.

Pride in the history of Oregon and devotion to its ideals require maintenance of the State Historical Society, which has been in existence five years, with steadily increasing interest. It is a matter of regret that it was not begun earlier, when historical material was more abundant and pioneer reminiscence had not so nearly faded out; for much has been lost that would have been highly valuable for our records, and material has been gathered by collectors and carried out of the country, and cannot now be reclaimed. Yet the Historical Society has done much, for the time it has been in existence and with the limited resources at its disposal, to form a basis for future work. It is steadily enlarging the circle of its membership, and awakening an increasing interest among the people. It is, in fact, an important part of the public educational system.

The society has a present membership of 819 persons, including 115 life members. It has members in nearly every county, and desires to have members in all. The small annual contribution from each—two dollars—is as necessary as helpful in meeting the minor expenses of the society. The City of Portland thus far has furnished the society, free of charge, with rooms in the City Hall. The collection of historical records and various objects of interest pertaining to the history of the Oregon Country already is very large. Of documents of various kinds, manuscripts, letters and newspapers, many of them going back to the very beginning of the movement of our pioneers to the Pacific Coast, an immense number has been collected. As fast as

gathered they are assorted and filed. In this collection are 150 bound volumes of newspapers, and unbound newspapers almost innumerable, many of them old and rare, and not to be duplicated. At present the society is filing 140 newspapers of the current time.—Oregonian.

Band to Play on Lewis And Clark Route

The state band of North Dakota, 100 strong, is planning to follow the route of Lewis and Clark, and give daily concerts at the principal places, arriving at Portland at the same time of the year as the explorers. The band is under leadership of J. H. Zimmerman, who is planning the tour. The organization will be augmented with the best material to be found in North Dakota, Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, and will be drilled for several weeks before starting on the overland trip.

Centennial Notes.

Almost every county in the state of Oregon will have an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

Photographs of several hundred school buildings will form an interesting feature of Oregon's educational exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

The Italian Commissioner, Mr. Zeggio, is now in Venice arranging for the collection of an exhibit of Italian works of arts for the Lewis and Clark Fair.

Lewis and Clark souvenir gold dollars are proving popular as Christmas presents. They are mounted as stick pins, or used in groups of two or three as breast pins.

An elegantly mounted wild cat, shot fifteen years ago on the site of the Agricultural Building at the Lewis and Clark Centennial, will be on exhibit at the Fair.

Coos county, Oregon, will have a pavilion of its own at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. The building will be constructed entirely of Coos county woods, and will be in itself an exhibit of interest.

The Legislature of the state of Washington will be asked to appropriate \$75,000 for the erection of a state building and the collection of a suitable exhibit for the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

The building which will house Russia's exhibit of paintings by modern Russian artists at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be a replica of an old Moscow palace used by the Romanoff kings of the early times.

The art display at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be of fabulous value, representing more money than will be spent in producing the entire Exposition. There will be not a few paintings worth on the market at least \$100,000 each, and the aggregate value of the display will amount to millions of dollars.
