Mines and Miners,

Of Southern Oregon.

Splendid Prospect.

James McNulty, who, with his brother John, has been working for the Galice Consolidated Mining Co. on Galice Creek, Josephine county, and who returned a week or two ago to their property on Spencer Gulch near Rich, was a pleasant caller at this sanctum Tuesday.

The McNulty Bros. are opening up a ledge on their claims on Spencer gulch that is as promising as anything in Southern Oregon upon which the same amount of development work been done and bids fair to make the boys independent in the no distant future unless all present indications fail.

These experienced mining men were for years Southern Oregon pocket hunters and it was while in quest of a rich pocket which they supposed lay somewhere up Spencer Gulch and which they found rich traces of all the way up, that they discovered the ledge upon which they are now diligently at work. It was the wash of fine gold from a ledge, not from a rich pocket as they had supposed that they had been tracing, and they settled down right there and commenced developing the property, giving up the quest for rich pockets, believing that they had as good a thing as they cared for, altho' it might require several years of patient toil to develop the property and make of it a real paying gold mine.

Even the surface rock of the ledge shows free gold and as depth is gained the ledge has shown greater width and higher values. The Sentinel has a sample of the ore which seems to be oxidized iron pyrites, of a free milling character which shows good values. The ledge is wide and carries good values throughout while in some instances it has produced samples running \$50.00 and better in gold.

Development is being carried on as rapidly as possible with moderate means upon the two ledges which traverse the two quartz claims owned by the boys, and recent development has been most gratifying. They located the property three or four years ago and now have a shaft down 60 feet on the ledge, also a tunnel in from the side which taps the ledge at a good depth and upon which they have drifted both toward and from the shaft. Within the next few years the boys expect to put in a small quartz mill and have the mine make its own way, which from present indications it will certainly be able to do, besides turning out a neat profit every month to its industrious and persistent owners.

More Gold From Bolen Creek.

Word comes to town this week of the discovery of some very rich ground on Bolen creek, in the vicinity of the famous Briggs claim, and about nine miles from Holland says the Oregon Mining Journal. The property is owned and operated by N. F. Hull and C. C. Matthews, both gentleman formerly of this city. The ledge seems to be largely of cyanite formation with a porphyry foot wall. The vein averages about 15 inches in width, and is rich in both coarse and fine gold, many nuggets of \$20 value being found. The property was bought not long since by Messrs. Hail and Matthews from Stuart and Bamfield. Parties, who have visited the property, say that the ore in the vein is as rich as any taken from the Briggs claim. It is hoped that this discovery may prove all

that is claimed for it, as it, in conjunction with the other rich quartz properties on Bolen creek, will do much to advertise that section of the country. It will be remembered that the large nugget recently found by Jacob Klippel and weighing \$475 in value, was found on Bolen creek.

GOOD INVESTMENT

H. M. White of Grants Pass Puts \$460 in a Mining Claim and is Offered \$15,000 for Same Now.

That money invested in mining property in Southern Oregon gives handsome and sometimes fabulous returns has been proven by the history of many investments made in the Grants Pass section in years gone by, and every day one hears of someone or some company that has made a stake in this manner, and one of the most recent illustrations of this was the purchase of the "Maid of the Mist," on Thompson creek, not long ago, by Mr. H. M. White of this city says the Grants Pass Herald.

The claim was located some years ago by John Hoffman, and considerable free milling ore was taken out by that gentleman in a thousand feet of tunnel work which he managed to do at little expense. When he thought he had taken all there was to be had in the claim, it was for sale. Through the advice of a friend Mr. White purchased the claim for \$450, and immediately started in to do further development. Twenty tons of ore has been milled since that time with the result that the returns netted him \$1000, about \$50 to the ton. Parties are now investigating the property with a view to purchase at \$15,000. All mining investments are not so fortunate as this one, but it is only one instance of many such investments made in Southern Oregon, and when good judgment is used and proper caution exercised, there is no better field for this kind of investment in the entire west than in this section of country.

Bonded Copper Group.

C. D. Larson and G. Wales of Spokane have bonded a copper property near the Blue Ledge. The interest of Spokane people in the future of the Blue Ledge is being shown in many ways, and when this central property has thoroughly opened its ore bodies a rush from north-country miners is expected. Many Spokane men who became interested when Patsy Clark bonded the Blue Ledge have held to their interest.
