Jacksonville is certainly taking rapid strides forward in the way of public improvement and private enterprise. The latest is electric lights and a real, live band, both of which we are now reasonably sure of. Let 'em come!

The professional "knocker" is always in evidence and it seems that it requires the combined efforts of at least 20 good men to counteract his influence. Sometimes he proves a real benefit to a community but he is generally a nuisance.

There are few, if any, says the Wasco News, who are so base as to hope that Senator Mitchell is guilty. For over 20 years he has been our most trusted representative at Washington. It would be a sad thing to know that the gray-haired veteran of Oregon legislators has been guilty of the betrayal of the people's trust, and we hope that he will be able to prove his innocence; if guilty, let him take the consequence of his acts.

Forest Grove, the educational center and site of the Pacific University, decided at its recent election, in favor of license and will now have saloons, for the first time in its history. The population of this place is certainly undergoing some sort of a change. For years and years even the railroad was not allowed within the corporate limits of the city for fear of a demoralizing influence, and now they are voting in favor of saloons.

Since Senator Mitchell's indictment by the Federal grand jury for alleged participation in the timber land frauds in Oregon, he has not appeared in the Senate Chamber but remains in the seclusion of his room. With Congressman Herman it is different. He is in his seat in the Representative hall regularly and gives no outward sign that he is in any way concerned about indictments and timber land frauds. This is the characteristic difference in the men.

The Roseburg Plaindealer has recently been sued for \$10,000 damages by F. E. Wooley, chairman of the school board, who alleges to have been damaged to that extent by an article appearing in that paper and signed "Taxpayer" the real author of which the management refuses to disclose. If everybody that imagines they are injured by newspaper attacks could secure a judgment for such a sum of money there would be no newspapers in a short time.

## ORDINANCE NUMBER III.

Passed by the Council at a meeting held Saturday evening, January 7, 1905.

**PROVIDING** for the granting of a franchise for a term of fifty years, to A. E. Reames, his heirs, successors in interest and assigns, to establish, repair and maintain at any and all points within the corporate limits of the said town of Jacksonville, electrical and power plant or plants, for the manufacture, transmission, sale and distribution of electrical light power for any and all purposes for which electricity is used, with the right to establish, maintain and repair such plants; to erect maintain and repair in all of the streets and alleys of said town, electrical and power poles, and to stretch maintain and repair thereon, electrical light and power wires, and to erect and maintain therein any other means for the transmission of electrical power; with the right to sell and distribute electrical light and power for any and all purposes, and to change or alter said plant or plants, poles, wires and other means for the conveyance of electrical power, and to these ends to make excavations in any or all of the streets and alleys of said town; to provide for the trimming of trees and removal of obstructions for the establishment of said electrical lines and the repairing of the same, and to prohibit the injury or defacement, and posting of advertising matter upon any of said poles, and to provide a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

The people of the town of Jacksonville, Oregon, do ordain as follows, to-wit:

**Section 1:** That there is hereby granted unto A. E. Reames, his heirs, successors in interest and assigns, the right, for a period of fifty years from the date at which this ordinance shall take effect, to erect, maintain and operate at any point within the corporate limits of the town of Jacksonville, Oregon as now or hereafter established or incorporated, any plant or plants, for the manufacture, consumption, sale and distribution of electrical power for light, fuel, power or any other purpose for which electrical power may be used; with the right to erect stations or sub-stations therein for any of said purposes, and to erect, maintain and operate therein electrical light, fuel and power lines, and other means for the conveying of electrical power, for the consumption, sale and distribution to consumers and to said town of Jacksonville of electrical power for light, fuel, power and all other purposes for which electrical power may be utilized; with the right to establish, repair and maintain in all of the streets and alleys of said town as the same exists or may hereafter exist, poles and electrical wires for the consumption, sale and distribution of electrical power for all of said purposes; with the right to make all necessary excavations in said streets and alleys for said purpose, and to sell, consume and distribute for hire or otherwise at any and all points within said town, electrical power for all of said purposes; with full and complete power to increase, alter or exchange said poles and lines or to build, repair and maintain additional ones, or others in their stead, and to all of said ends to do all acts necessary to carry these powers into effect, provided, however, that all poles erected in the streets or alleys of said town for any of said purposes shall be not less than twenty-five feet high, and shall be set at such points as will interfere the least with public travel and traffic, consistent, however, with the uses and powers herein granted; provided further that at the completion of the establishment of such pole lines or of any repairs thereon, the owner or owners of this franchise shall make such repairs in said streets and alleys as put the same in as good condition as they were at the beginning of said work. Provided, further, that this franchise shall be void if the owner thereof shall not, within three months after the date at which the same goes into effect, either transmit into the said town of Jacksonville, or manufacture therein electrical power for light or fuel purposes, to be furnished then to consumers for hire.

**Section 2:** The owner or owners of this franchise shall have the right in the erection, construction or repair of poles and wire lines or other means for transmitting electricity, to trim any trees in any streets or alleys necessary to be trimmed for the purpose of stretching wires in such streets or alleys, or erecting poles and lines therein, doing as little damage to such trees as possible consistent with the powers herein granted, and shall have the right in such streets and alleys to remove any obstructions necessary to be removed for erecting, repairing and maintaining such lines,

doing as little damage in every instance as is consistent with the use and powers herein granted.

**Section 3:** Nothing in this franchise shall be construed to compel or require the town of Jacksonville to purchase or hire from the owner or owners of this franchise, any light or power, whatever.

**Section 4:** No person shall deface, cut, whittle, injure, or mutilate, or post advertising matter upon any electrical light or power pole or poles erected within the corporate limits of the town of Jacksonville, under the provisions of this or any ordinance. Any person violating the provisions of this section of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not less than one nor more than fifteen dollars; or by imprisonment for not less than one nor more than five days.

**Section 5:** A failure by the owner or owners of this franchise for a period of six consecutive months in any one year to transmit into said town electricity for hire or to manufacture the same for said purpose shall annul this franchise.
