The M. E. Sunday school commences the new year in a most healthy and prosperous condition and if its growth continues during the next few months like it has in the past few it will certainly be remarkable. Under the able supervision of Mr. C. W. Conklin and his able assistants the school has made steady progress until now an attendance of 80 or 90 is nothing unusual, while the collections are exceedingly good and the interest taken by those present indicates that the officers are well suited to their work.

It is given out that in order to assist in the immigration work of bringing settlers into the Northwest, the Harriman lines will reduce the rate on immigrant movables, carloads, from \$1 per 100 pounds from Missouri river common points to 50 cents per 100 pounds; or in other words, cut the rate in two. This reduction will apply to all points on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, Ashland and north. This reduction will amount to \$100 and over per car, and the rate, of 50 cents is an exceptionally low rate, being lower than the present rate on any other commodity.

Sheriff Geo. W. Lewis will leave Friday evening for Salem to take to the penitentiary, W. H. Kirby, Geo. Linsay Jas. La Deux, Martin Wall and Tom Duffy, who each were tried in the circuit court this week on burglary charges and given sentences of from one to two years each says the Grants Pass Courier.
