DEATHS RECENTLY

Several Deaths Occur in Jacksonville During the Past Week. Bert Loutzenheiser, the Injured Miner, Among the Number.

OTHER LOCAL ITEMS OF INTEREST

The death of Phillip Gleave took place at his residence in Jacksonville on Tuesday Jan. 17th 1905 at 1 o'clock p. m. after an illness of several weeks. After the funeral service, which was conducted by Rev. Robert Ennis, the remains were interred in the Jacksonville cemetery. Mr. Gleave was one of the old pioneers of this section, having come here early in the fifties and his demise is mourned by a large circle of friends. The Sentinel will endeavor to get the necessary particulars and publish an obituary next week such as the deceased merits.

Death of Jno. H. Hoffman.

The death of Mr. Jno. H. Hoffman took place Tuesday at 1 o'clock, a. m. at his home on Oregon street near Jackson creek where he has been lying for some time seriously ill.

Mr. Hoffman leaves a wife, Mrs. Kate Hoffman, to whom he was married on Jan. 15th 1902. She is a sister of Mrs. David Linn and Mrs. C. C. Beekman, a member of a well known Pioneer family and one who has many old time friends in the vicinity who sympathize with her in her bereavement.

Mr. Hoffman came to Jacksonville in 1871 and worked for Mr. Kubli at his trade, that of tinsmith, for a great many years. In January 1902 he was married to Miss Kate Hoffman who was the only near relative of his, living on the Coast.

The funeral was held at the residence on Wednesday at 2:00 o'clock p. m. conducted by Rev. Robert Ennis, and the remains interred in Jacksonville cemetery.

Injured Man Dies.

Mr. Bert Loutzenheiser, the miner who was injured so seriously at the Opp mine a week or ten days ago, was unexpectedly taken worse about noon Wednesday and died within a few minutes. He seemed to be as well, or even better than usual that morning, but along toward noon, was taken slightly sick to his stomach which caused vomiting. A short time afterwards, Frank Kassher, noticing the unusual pallor of the man's face, turned down the covers and found to his surprise that he was bleeding to death, hence he sent for the doctor at once who stopped the flow of blood, but it was then too late to save the man's life, as the pulse was barely perceptible and he was barely alive. The only theory is that during his vomiting spell he had caused some jagged piece of the broken bone to pierce the artery. Not even the patient himself had discovered that he was bleeding to death even when he was almost dead from loss of blood.

Mr. Loutzenheiser was 47 years, 1 month and 1 day old and a native of Ohio where his people still reside. He had not been in this vicinity very long and had formerly resided in Colorado where Mrs. A. Steele had known him years ago. The funeral services are to be held today conducted by Rev. Robert Ennis.

Jacksonville Electric Company File Articles of Incorporation With Secretary of State--Reames, Ray and Diesch Incorporators.

CAPITALIZATION FIXED AT \$10,000

The Jacksonville Electric Company filed articles of incorporation with the Secretary of State Wednesday, naming as incorporators Dr. C. R. Ray, A. E. Reames and Peter Diesch, with a capital stock of \$10,000. The new company elected Directors yesterday who will meet for the first time today.

The new company will purchase electric current of The Condor Power & Water Co., whose line to the Opp mill already runs through town, and will re-tail it to the town of Jacksonville and other consumers within the city limits. The transformer is already in, having been located in the warehouse of T. J. Kenney and the contract is let for putting in about 120 poles within the city limits and work has already been commenced by the contractors W. E. Finey, Wm. Broad, and F. M. Roundtree who are to have the poles all in place within two weeks.

Thursday the residence of T. J. Kenney and the office of A. E. Reames were wired and others are to follow immediately, hence, when the lines are ready, in the town, all that will be necessary will be to attach them to the wires that will already have been put in place in business houses and residences.

License Revoked.

The trustees of Central Point, at its December meeting, granted a saloon license to George B. Rose, notwithstanding that the town had gone "dry" in the November election. There has been some interest in the outcome as to whether the board's license or the precinct vote should prevail. The Tidings says that point has been settled by a complaint that Ross had failed to meet the board's requirements, and in consequence he has forfeited his bond, has been tendered a pro rata amount of the license money paid in, and lost his license.

Experimental Drive.

Dr. C. Ray, manager of the Condor Water & Power Co., spent Saturday and Sunday in Portland, and later went to Salem with members of the legislature. Dr. Ray is ready to proceed with his lumber operations on Rogue River and has invited bids for the cutting of 500,000 feet for an experimental drive. He has sent a force of men to the falls recently bought from Sahlstrom, where it will be necessary to put in a flume if the river is used for log driving. The enlarged power plant is nearing completion.—Mining Journal.
