SOME ARE NEWSY; SOME ARE NOT

Well-known Steamer Wrecked.

The well-known steamer, Geo. W. Elder, belonging to the O. R. & N., and plying between Portland and San Francisco, struck a submerged rock in the Columbia river near Goble last Saturday evening. A terrible hole was torn in her hull, amidships and had not the wreck hung balanced upon the rock, probably every soul on board would have been lost. The water is 100 feet deep under her bows and astern it is over 30 feet. The vessel has settled until it covers the engines and reaches to the main deck. Late reports state that it will be impossible to get the vessel off the rocks and that it, together with the cargo, will be turned over to the underwriters who will pay the full amount of the insurance. There were about thirty passengers on board bound for San Francisco and a crew of twenty-five, which were all rescued by the steamer Hassalo or went ashore in the life boats.

Southern Oregon Winter.

Wherever one's lot is cast it is human nature to overlook many of the blessings and beauties of their immediate locality and to long for those of some other country which, perhaps they have never seen and of which they know but little. Yet here in Southern Oregon, perhaps, is found a class of people, who are as happy and contented as those of any other locality on the face of the earth. And why shouldn't this be the case? Here is a land rich in natural advantages, as rich as any county upon which the sun shines, beautiful beyond description with its verdant valleys, evergreen hills and snow-capped mountain peaks in the distance; blessed with a climate that is a happy medium between the delightful, sunny clime of the South and the rigors and sudden changes of the "blizzardy" blustering north. No wonder that the people who come here to try it a season, prepare to spend the remainder of their days in this favored spot and remain here until they are laid away in one of the many beautiful hillside burying grounds that overlook the peaceful valleys of the "Italy of Oregon." A drive through the valley at this season of the year is as interesting as it is pleasant especially to one born and raised in the Middle West, as was the writer. In fact it is a revelation. The country now resembles some countries late in the spring for nowhere is there aught to remind one that it is now "in the dead of winter." In the fields the farmers are plowing and adjoining fields are green with growing grain. Grass is growing by the roadside and in the pastures where thirty-looking herds are browsing while in the trees and on the fences, meadowlarks are basking in the sunshine and sending forth their glad song. And this is winter in Southern Oregon.

Remarkable Graftings.

Speaking of grafting, the following story by Jas. Newland, surely "takes the cake." "In the spring of 1895 we were butchering a pig just at apple grafting time. My brother, who was helping me, cut off the pig's tail, and threw it on the ground. It attracted my attention and my mind being full of horticultural

schemes, I immediately took it while yet warm, inclosed it in a tube of fresh apple bark taken from Bailey Sweet apple tree and using the whole as a scion, I grafted it into a vigorous Ben Davis tree standing near the cow-barn. To my astonishment, the scion grew. It had a peculiar look from the start, and I was greatly worked up about it. When it bore, I was delighted to find that each apple contained in place of the ordinary core, a fine pork sausage. The tree has borne abundantly every other year since, and we have had baked sweet apples and sausage to our hearts content. The only drawback is that the sausage lacks seasoning, but I am experimenting now on a line which I think will entirely remedy that small defect."
