During the first nine months of last year there were 3,423 births in the state of Oregon and 2,272 deaths. During the same period there were 146 births in Jackson county 75 males and 71 females, and 64 deaths, 34 of which were males and 30 females.

Rev. S. M. Eby, who formerly owned a farm near Jacksonville but removed to Southern California a couple of years ago, died at Santa Anna, the 6th of this month, aged about 60 years. Six carloads of poles for the Condor Water & Power Co, to be used on the Grants Pass light and power line, are being unloaded at this point. J. B. Crawford is superintending the work of unloading and distributing. The poles are Washington cedar and will stand 30 feet to the weather with five feet buried. Mr. Crawford says the line will be completed for business within 60 days.—Grants Pass Herald.

There is but little difference in the price of steers on the Chicago market now and one year ago, the choice grades being a little higher now than then, says the Oregon Agriculturist. Common packing hogs are about 20 cents per hundred pounds cheaper than a year ago. Sheep and lambs are about \$1 per hundred pounds higher than they were a year ago.

The California Fruit Grower says the prune market shows no change, the situation remaining firm. The number who anticipate a better market and better prices on this commodity for the spring and summer are on the increase.
