A correspondent from Provolt states that L. W. Smith the enterprising merchant there is soon going to enlarge his store building on account of a rapidly increasing business which he gets from the Applegate and Williams creek valleys and the miners and stockmen back in the hills.

Hop grubbing has commenced at the Rehkopf hop yard on Applegate, which is unusually early for that locality says a Courier correspondent from Provolt. The growers there are trying to keep in line with the Rogue River Valley hop growers who, for climatic reasons, seem to have earlier seasons in which to begin work in the yards.

M. V. Pernoll and James Flowers, who are putting a 25 acre hop yard on the Pernoll farm two miles below Applegate postoffice were in Grants Pass Saturday each to secure a wagon load of hop roots which they had purchased from growers of this vicinity says the Grants Pass Courier. They will rush their planting at once in order to give the roots an early growth in the spring. Their yard is on the Applegate bottom and the land is under ditch and it is their purpose to irrigate the yard in dry seasons. Hop roots grow near the surface and thus would be greatly injured by dry weather as well as benefitted by irrigation. By giving the yard a thorough irrigating at the time the hops are forming, it is expected that the yield can be greatly increased.
