SOME ARE NEWSY; SOME ARE NOT

Herman Must Explain.

Evening Telegram:— Before the Federal grand jury of the District of Columbia to be called in special session at the request of U. S. Dist. Attorney for Oregon F. J. Heney, Congressman Binger Herman will be called to explain, if he can, what became of certain records known to be missing from the general land office, of which Mr. Herman was commissioner-general. It will be the effort of Mr. Heney to secure indictment of Mr. Herman on a charge of having destroyed these documents and records, supposedly to conceal his own guilt or the guilt of confederates in connection with the Oregon land frauds. This investigation must be carried on in Washington, D. C. because it was there that the records disappeared, and that the crime which is alleged, was committed.

Reconsidered Action.

The following is a news dispatch to the Ashland Tidings, dated Feb. 15th: The Jackson county delegation has reconsidered its action in agreeing to a change in the salary of the school superintendent and county judge and the pay of these officials will remain for the present, at least, at \$1,000 each. Judge Dunn had no knowledge of the proposal for a raise in his salary and Superintendent Daily had not asked the delegation for an increase of the pay of his office, but it is generally acknowledged that in both instances the pay is hardly in proportion to other county officials. At a late hour, however, an objection was heard to any raise of pay for the school superintendent's office and the delegation decided to withdraw the measure providing for it, which contained also the provision for raising the county judge's pay \$300 per annum.
