However, let us hope that peace and prosperity, will continue to prevail, regardless of who is elected to the various offices.

Since Senator Mitchell's law partner, Judge A. H. Tanner, who was recently indicted, has made a full confession and implicated the aged Senator, public sentiment is rapidly changing and the conviction is becoming forced upon the minds of even his most loyal friends that he has been "on the square" with the people of Oregon who have trusted him so implicitly for so many years. However he still proclaims his innocence and declares he will "stick it out" until this session is over when he will return to Oregon and prove his innocence to all the world. It looks now as though it would be an impossibility with such an array of evidence against him.

THE TERRIBLE WAGES OF SIN.

The death of C. T. Beckwith, president of the Oberlin, Ohio, bank which was wrecked by Mrs. Chadwick, was caused by a broken heart brought about by the disgrace and the knowledge that through his indiscretion, hundreds of poor people had lost their savings through the machinations of an adventuress and the cupidity of a banker, says the Astorian. Under ordinary circumstances the death would be considered murder, but the contributory negligence on the part of Beckwith makes it justifiable homicide. The depositors of the Oberlin bank will not mourn for Beckwith as much as they will for the money entrusted to his care and keeping. The Beckwith case is an illustration showing the frailties of human nature. It shows how susceptible some men are to the wiles of capricious women whose hypnotic influence sways them from the paths of rectitude and honesty. There is no doubt that Mr. Beckwith died of humiliation, wounded pride and broken fortunes. He had been indicted for violations of the national banking laws and was probably guilty of making unauthorized loans of bank funds to Mrs. Chadwick. He had been duped, however, into the belief that he was perfectly safe in loaning his own as well as the bank's money to this woman, and no doubt confidently expected to reap large benefits, individually and for the bank through his trans-

actions with this adventuress. He was an old man, accounted keen and shrewd, avaricious and mercenary. He was over-anxious to make inordinate and illegitimate profits and Mrs. Chadwick simply sold him a gold brick. He was an easy victim to the woman's wiles and when his exposure and disgrace came he longed to die. Death came to his relief and the world will perhaps never know the full story of Mrs. Chadwick's operations with him. The desire to make inordinate profits tempts many a man to do what he ought not. The regulations for the management of national banks are designed to guard the depositors and stockholders of such institutions against just such results as followed the unauthorized loans to Mrs. Chadwick. It looked so easy to Mr. Beckwith to make big returns on the loans to her and to secure the handling of a large fund that he took his chances. The bait was too tempting to resist. Her securities were a myth, her alleged, relations to Andrew Carnegie was a poor fiction, and her documents were forged. Beckwith was only one of many victims, but when he overstepped the bounds of prudence of his bank and became a criminal in law and morals. Mrs. Chadwick's career was as villainous as it was spectacular and the death of Mr. Beckwith is one of its fruits.
