Mines and Miners,

Of Southern Oregon.

A. C. Hooper, of the Mt. Pitt Mining Company, states that he has eight men at work and they are running their arrastra night and day with good results and that on their placer mine on Bummer Gulch they have a No. 1 giant at work, operated by 400 feet of eight inch pipe under 100 foot pressure.

F. E. Willetts, who built both the Opp and the Granite Hill stamp mills, which are without doubt two of the most perfectly constructed quartz mills in the state of Oregon, is now drawing plans and specifications for a stamp mill for the Oregon Belle mine on Forest creek about five miles west of Jacksonville. This mill will no doubt be operated with electric power from the Condor Water & Power Co.'s plant at Gold Ray as the extension of the line but a few miles west from the Opp mill, the present terminus of the electric line, is all that would be required to make the necessary connection for the proposed new mill.

Rich Strike Reported.

Word comes from Woodville of quite a rich strike on the property adjoining the Homestake mine which has produced some very excellent ore. The ore recently discovered will average as high as \$116 to the ton and at present the vein has a width of four feet. The mine is being equipped in first class style and a superintendent secured from Eastern Oregon who was formerly amalgamator at the famous Elkhorn mine.

Homesteader Is Missing.

It is reported that William King, a Trail precinct homesteader is missing from his home and that a brother, who has recently returned from a fruitless search for him, is considerably worried over his unexpected disappearance. They found his cabin deserted and the door standing open, although there was no evidence that the missing man had been there for some time. It is feared that he has become lost somewhere in the mountains and perished as he would doubtless have let his friends know of it had he contemplated leaving for any length of time.

Placer Mining Suffers.

And here it is almost the first of March and yet we have had scarcely any of the winter rains for which Oregon winters are noted. Last month an inch and a half of rain fell in this section and this far during February has been no improvement. Sunny days and frosty nights are the rule yet and, altho' it is the most delightful weather imaginable it is most awfully hard on the placer miner who depends entirely on the winter rains for his supply of water and without which he can accomplish nothing. There is little prospect at this time, of the placer run being up to the average unless the spring is an unusually good one. Without a doubt the season would have eclipsed all records if there had been a plentiful water supply, for more extensive preparations had been made for hydraulic operations in Southern Oregon than for many years.

Unique Quartz Mill.

There will be on exhibition in the Southern Oregon mining exhibit at the Lewis & Clarke fair a mining contrivance of a very unusual nature. It is nothing

more nor less than a home made, hand power quartz mill, worthy of the inventive brain of "Willie Westinghouse Edison Smith" of comic picture fame. The machine consists of a squared section of a fir log some two feet in diameter. In the center of this timber a trough had been dug out some eight or ten inches wide. In the bottom of this trough a granite block is fitted and a second block of the same material works back and forth upon it, being fastened by a set of hinges to the upper part of the log and works back and forth by means of a lever. The ore is ground between the two granite blocks and runs out over a plate as in ordinary mills. The mill is complete with plates, screens and all, and was in operation no later than last summer in the Willow Springs district. Dr. Reddy now has charge of it and says that he has seen almost every kind of mining appliance but never before one like this. —Medford Mail.

Attempt to Murder Brooks.

H. H. Brooks, formerly editor of the Roseburg Plaindealer and a man who is supposed to have valuable information for the federal authorities relative to the land frauds in Southern Oregon, narrowly escaped death, together with his son, by fire one morning last week, supposed to be of incendiary origin. It is supposed that his knowledge of certain land fraud matters was the cause of the attempt. The neighing of horses in the yard saved the two men from terrible deaths in the store of the Holbrook Mercantile Company, at Holbrook. Fire was set under the building and a heavy charge of dynamite exploded, undoubtedly by an enemy or enemies, who deliberately attempted to kill father and son, who were wrapped in slumber at the time. Destruction of the premises was wrought by the flames, and the terrific explosion, working damage to the extent of \$2,500.
