Short Paragraphs Regarding Doings Throughout the Length and Breadth of Jackson County as We Succeed in Capturing Them.

SOME ARE NEWSY; SOME ARE NOT

About the beginning of the year Harry Grant, a fine appearing young gentleman came to gold Hill seeking a building on the business side of the town in order to open up a gents furnishing store. After two or three visits to the town from Grants Pass, which place he claimed as his headquarters, he deciding to begin business and rented the Counts building on the south side, moving in a fine stock of clothing, boots and shoes, and gent's furnishings. The firm of Welch and Grant did not do a very large business in this out-of-the way place and Mr. Grant found time rather heavy on his hands, so found time to buy a fine team of horses and a nice buggy and other articles for which he did not always pay, but he was of a genial nature and no one thought of pressing for payment. He also found time to court one of Gold Hill's foremost young ladies, Miss May Curry, to whom he was united in matrimony Febr. 24th in Jacksonville. On the 1st of March he rented the McClendon building on the other side of the town next to the Gold Hill bank and moved the stock over to the new location. He had the building entirely renovated at the firm's expense bought shelving, counters, etc. for which he did not pay and opened with a fine display of goods about the 10th of the present month. Three or four days later Albert Welch of Portland appeared.

The same time Mr. Grant had urgent business in Jacksonville, to which place he drove his fine team. He has not been seen since by the people of Gold Hill. Of course there were many rumors when he did not come back and people began to think that there was something wrong and were positive of that fact when the doors of the store were closed Friday and Mr. Welch began to have the goods packed for shipment. The goods were shipped away next day, and Mr. Welch paid all bills against the firm. Whether or not Mr. Grant will come back and pay his bills is another question. His wife has turned over all the household furniture and furnishings to the creditors. Young Grant neither drank nor gambled while here and many people are at a loss to understand his strange disappearance. Nothing can be learned from his wife or her people in regard to his whereabouts and it may be that he will return to Gold Hill. Mr. Grant rather startled the residents of this staid town during his eight weeks career and furnished the climax, with his mysterious disappearance.—Grants Pass Herald.

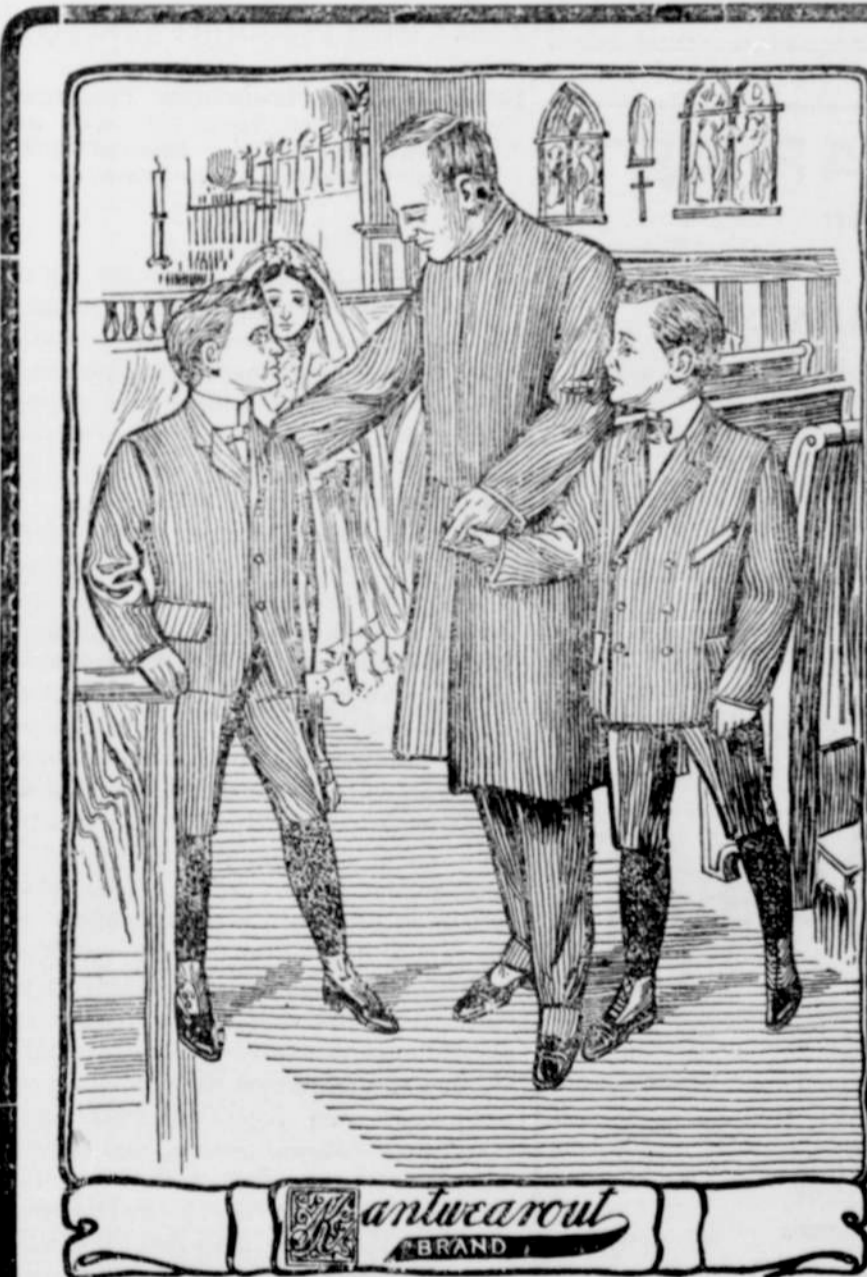
