S. army coat with brass buttons, seventeen half dollar pieces of dates 1837 to 1847. Three Mexican dollars of date 1840. all looking fresh and new on one side but discolored on the other, a great quantity of beads variegated in color and all sizes, an old tashioned scalping knife and large beaver trap with a long chain wrapped around it. The coat and blanket were in fairly good state of preservation. Mr. Ring is now buisily engaged in hunting for more Indian on 19th. graves and accompanying relics.
