Will Soon Arrive.

Two hundred Igorottes, Moros, Negritos and Visayans will leave the Philippine islands this week, arriving in Portland the latter part of April, where they proceed immediately to the grounds of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. These natives will populate the Philip-

phine village on the Government peninsula at the Exposition.

Upon their arrival, the construction of the Philippine village will be started at once. A feature of this will be a city of houses built on poles over the surface of Guild's Lake. This is characteristic of the expedient resorted to by the natives to avoid reptiles and foes of similar kind. The city of pole-houses will be occupied by the Moros, who with the Igorottes stand lowest in the scale of civilization.

Boiled dog will represent the principal substance of the Igorottes, who are conceded to be epicureans regarding this delicacy. The general supposition is that a hearty meal of boiled, fried or roasted canine adds fervor to the fighting powers of Igorotte warriors. Accordingly, the dog flesh is served only to the males, the fairer sex being denied the rare treat.

Visitors to the Centennial, however, need have no fear of witnessing a blood-curdling combat, unless the Portland police should become obstreperous in the presence of the Igorottes, which would naturally result in a lively scene.
