Medford's Grand Jubilee.

Although very little notice had been given that the ground would be broken at the western terminus of the Medford and Crater Lake Railroad, a very large crowd assembled Tuesday afternoon to witness that auspicious event says the Southern Oregonian. It is estimated that 2,000 people were present. The affair was entirely impromptu, no program in particular having been arranged, still none the less interesting.

The terminal grounds are located in the northern suburbs of Medford, on a tract of land purchased of Mrs. S. E. Ish, and are admirably suited for the purpose.

The exercises were opened by Holbrook Withington, the attorney of the railroad company, who presided. In some well-chosen remarks he gave the object of the gathering and outlined what might be expected of this enterprise.

D. H. Miller, upon behalf of the Commercial Club, which played such an important part in securing this important proposition for our city, occupied the attention of the audience for a short time and presented a number of interesting facts.

Hon. H. B. Miller of Eugene, U. S. Consul to Yokahama, who was present by invitation then entertained the assemblage in his usual clever manner. He dwelt particularly upon the greatness of the Pacific Coast, its resources and possibilities, and urged that Southern Oregon was an important part of it.

To Mrs. A. A. Davis was accorded the honor of removing the first shovelful of earth, and as she broke the bottle of champagne over it a new and important era in Medford's existence was ushered in.

Hon. W. I. Vawter closed the occasion with excellent remarks that were quite appropriate.

The Medford Band was much in evidence and cleverly rendered a number of choice selections.
