Capture a Baby Lion.

Grants Pass Herald—W. B. Sherman, the timberman, returned Tuesday from a trip in the mountains showing timber lands to some California people and while on the trip caught a mountain lion. There was a dog with the party, and they were looking over Battle mountain, at the head of Battle Creek, the dog struck a fresh track and soon it became evident that it had scented a wild animal. The party followed a hot pursuit, and after a short distance had been covered the dog brought the animal to bay. When they arrived on the scene it was found to be a mountain lion. After a few wild shots had been fired, the lion finding itself surrounded took refuge in a tree. A well-directed shot from Mr. Sherman's automatic pistol brought the animal to the ground. It was found to be a mother mountain lion. Two baby lions were found in a nearby cave. The dog rushed into the den and a fight was apparently on. Mr. Sherman fearing that an older lion was in the den, which would mean the death of his dog, rushed in with his automatic pistol, but found, to his surprise, the dog was grappling with a baby lion. Before the dog and lion could be separated the dog had injured the animal so badly that it soon died. Another baby lion was discovered in the cave, and the dog was about to pounce upon it, but Mr. Sherman, the hero of the day, crawled into the crevice of the cave, pulled the dog back and had it held outside while he crawled into the cave. Another struggle then ensued. After the dust had cleared away the hero came out with a very much alive baby lion in his clutches.

Excitement was then supreme, in which the whole party participated including the dog. One of the men was disrobed of a sweater which they converted into a straight jacket for the beast, which was easily carried into civilization.

Much to the surprise of the party the little fellow soon made up with them and seemed quite tame. The living prize was awarded to Mr. Sherman, as the hero of the day. It has been christened "King," and it now takes Mr. Sherman's entire office force to entertain the little monarch.—Grants Pass Herald.

Rich Strike at Oregon Belle.

A rich strike has been made by the New York & Western Mining Co., in the Oregon Belle mine, on Forest creek, twelve miles west of Medford. The Oregon Belle has been a steady producer for many years. It was sold two and a half years ago by its former owners, T. M. Reed and John Broad, to the New York & Western Co., which has been doing considerable development work ever since. Last week in a tunnel being run at a depth of 150 feet from the surface and 277 feet into the

side of the mountain an extremely rich body of ore was struck. The ledge is eight feet wide and gives every assurance of being permanent. Messrs. Foster and Gunnell, the managers of the mine, are reticent as to the value of the strike, but it is significant that they are making arrangements for the building of a ten-stamp mill on the property. It is expected that the mill will be running by June 1st.—Medford Mail.
